At 62 she was given her pension.

Superfast broadband provision

urrently the county's broadband infrastructure is not fit for purpose. This highly ruralised county lacks the infrastructure needed to connect to superfast broadband providers, and Braintree District is one of the poorest areas for broadband in the county: this needs to change. Funding has been granted from central government for the County Council to place high volumes of fibre optic wires in Essex, to access superfast broadband currently not available. Braintree District needs to make its case for access to this funding as strong as possible. Family home of Charles Darwin, Down House, was our first stop on the way, a fascinating insight

into this great man's life and an interesting garden - an easy run from Hatfield Peverel *(See photograph opposite)*. Other highlights included the Secret Gardens of Sandwich at the Salutation - a Lutyens and Jekyll design garden dating from 1911 and a Grade 1 listed house; and a trip on a Medway paddle steamer to visit Kent Life, 28 acres of rich and vibrant history of the county with exhibitions, dismantled and relocated buildings and rare breeds.

On our return journey we visited Sissinghurst

Castle, for some the highlight of the holiday, a garden in the ruin of an Elizabethan house, set in its own woods, streams and farmland with views on all sides across the fields and meadows of the Kentish landscape.

Writer Harold Nicholson and Vita Sackville-West, poet, novelist and gardener, first came here in 1930. The house and gardens were in a ruinous state and between them - on occasions quite acrimoniously - they created the garden we see today.

Parish Council vacancy

The Parish Council currently has a vacancy and would welcome applications from anyone who is interested in promoting local issues and ideas for the future of the village.

Planning

All planning meetings are open to the public. Notification of these meetings will be erected in the village notice boards three clear days prior to each meeting.

The following applications have recently been made

Erection of single storey rear garden room extension at The Old Vicarage, The Pines; erection of single storey cart shed and formation of new vehicular access at Shepherds Cottage, Church Road; erection of single storey side extension, replacement windows on front elevation and replacement porch at Oaklands, Ulting Road; erection of single storey side extension, erection of chimney and alterations and replacement windows at 45 Willow Crescent.

Application for removal of variation of condition following grant of planning permission - 99/01192/ FUL. Demolition of redundant treatment plant and a portakabin type office building. To install large liquid storage tanks and treatment plant, plus new portakabin type office and steel storage container at Arla Foods Plc, Bury Lane; demolition of existing bungalow and erection of three dwellings at Baswin, Church Road.

The following applications have been approved by the District Council

Erection of two rear single storey extensions, addition of windows at rear and replacement side at Crofton, Station Road.

Tree Preservation Orders

Work to trees at 34 Woodham Drive and 7 De Vere Close, and work to trees in the car park at Elizabeth Way - all passed to Tree Warden for comment.

Party in the Park

The Party in the Park took place on Saturday 13th July 2013 (see back page for full details). The Parish Council would like to thank Cllrs Endersby and Wallace and all the rest of the team of volunteers who assisted in the organisation of the party and to those that helped on the day to make it such a success.

Highways

Atkins have confirmed the current scheduled start date for works to the Wellington Bridge is 29th July 2013 for a duration of 12 weeks. There will be two narrow lanes in each direction on the A12 under the bridge and a 40mph speed limit for the duration of the works. There will be overnight closures on the A12 to allow contractors to install and remove the narrow lanes. Wellington Bridge will be closed overnight for part of the works.

Football Pavilion

Unfortunately, in June the football pavilion sustained substantial criminal damage to one wall by youths and therefore the Parish Council is currently obtaining quotations to demolish it. The whole incident was captured on CCTV which has been passed to Essex Police to assist with their enquiries and we understand one of the perpetrators has been identified. Discussion on whether to build another facility in its place is ongoing.

Down the road from Hatfield Peverel lay the Langford pumping station, built in 1928 to supply treated water to the Southend area. A piece of industrial history, The Museum of Power was created on the site in the 1990s by a group of enthusiasts who collected and restored redundant machinery. Much work, mostly carried out by volunteers, has continued over the years and the museum and its surroundings is well worth a visit - either by car, bike or on foot on some of our local paths. U meeting in June was brought forward a week, and this proved a lucky move as we strolled around Witham in glorious summer evening sunshine for the annual walking Treasure Hunt, designed to provide exercise for both mind and body! This year's winners were Nick Shakespear and his team,



which gives them the much-sought-after honour of setting next year's hunt! Many thanks to Anne and Trevor Williams for organizing a great evening ending with supper at Battesford Court Wetherspoons.

We were safely back to the village hall for July's meeting -a wine tasting and supper on a Swiss theme! Swiss wines are rarely found in the UK, as production is relatively small and few are exported. However, we were lucky to taste a Chasselas (Switzerland's most popular white wine grape) – quite expensive, but with an unusual nuts and honey flavour which wasn't to everyone's palate; we also sampled a Pinot Noir from the Valais region – again dearer than our usual wines, but comparable in price, style and quality with Pinot Noirs from nearby Burgundy in France. We also quaffed some more reasonably-priced nearly-Swiss wines with a sparkling wine from the Jura mountains between France and Switzerland (pronounced excellent value from Aldi at £6.99) and some Southern German whites and reds from the Württemberg region of Southern Germany, which borders Switzerland at Lake Constance or Bodensee. The meal was authentically Swiss! We enjoyed a 70s revival with each table cooking cheese fondue (thanks to Anne Mountfort, Ulrike Catt, Lesley Evans and Graham Bushby's neighbour for loaning the fondue sets) followed by typical cold meats including air-dried beef and smoked ham, rösti and various salads including celeriac and carrot. The evening finished with a guiz on Switzerland and a bar of Lindor chocolate for everyone. The quiz was won by Dave Belshaw who was happy to receive a large block of Toblerone, and the yodelling competition was a runaway victory for Bob Gammie's team (thankfully without the participation of the team captain!)

We had to switch swiftly back from thoughts of the mountains to thoughts of an event much nearer home – the Punch Up In The Park, the Wine Club's stall at the Party in the Park on 13th July. *(see Judy Lee's photo above)*. We offered tastings of seven punches ranging from the Peverel Duck Pond to a Tropical Lagoon, all widely different in flavour and appearance, and visitors to the stall marked these to identify their favourites. The runaway winning punch was made by Alan Porter, using a tried and tested recipe of Denise Brazier's, and the winner of the raffled bottle of wine was Margaret Joslin. Those who collected a flyer about the Wine Club are reminded they qualify for free admission to the Club's Spanish wine tasting in September on production of the flyer!

They perform a very worthwhile service and work closely with the police to see that these young people come to no harm and get home safely.

Village life in Hatfield Peverel year 2012/2013

Peter Horne remembers the year 2012 with a poem about village life, the Queen's Jubilee and the Olympic Games UK, celebrated this year by Party in the Park 2013

A forming, whirling, windstorm hit village Churchyard at it's head Narrowly missed the roof of church; metal-thieves had stripped all lead. Struck yard that had been well maintained - gravestones and whole trees littered! for wind had drawn trees out of ground; remorselessly embittered. Such gusts as reached ground level left other areas becalmed. Farmer's cowshed roof, near, damaged, but the cows within, unharmed! Long-established gravestones shattered, Essex Record Office traced? Roof-tiles rejected by lead-thieves? few, if any, wind-displaced!

But

In a world so full of troubles - a village of good repose; contentment and amenity, where conjecture and 'suppose' can yet find that fulfilment where intention meets endeavour; where care is still a byword: general feeling is together! Serviced Infant/Junior School. Achieved teachings can be seen on how to live; all learning modes. Themed Philosophy? 'Beseem?' Library? Good books still give much pleasure, in an age when techniques reign: but it's still good to live near Nature and the quiet country lane. At a time when all is on the move, when monitors control; single word that best describes it, root to canopy, is bole.

Days out with the WEA

The Summer programme - two excellent sunny days out to the Royal Dockyard at Chatham in June and Marks Hall estate and arboretum in July.

The dockyards, spacious and well set out, have many attractions for visitors including the three historic warships - HM Submarine Ocelot, the Victorian sloop HMS Gannet and the second world war destroyer HMS Cavalier, and the Victorian ropery (quarter of a mile long) where a guide gave us a history of the works where rope has been made since 1618, and is still made. Through the windows washing was blowing in the breeze: cameras were filming the popular BBC programme 'Call the Midwife'.

Another fine day for the visit to Marks Hall where Jonathan Jukes, Head Curator, gave us a conducted tour of the estate and arboretum. pine (100 saplings have been planted here - less than 100 adult trees survive in the wild). The oldest tree on site is the massive Honeywood oak, probably over 800 years old and one of the original 300 oaks once grown in the deer park.

The Police are working hard to keep us safe from thieves and those looking to make a swift buck. Do please read the following advice.

Heating oil theft

Anyone needing information about precautionary measures to reduce their vulnerability to theft of their heating oil can get advice by ringing the local Crime Reduction Officer on 0300 333 4444.

It couldn't happen to me!

Some weeks ago a friend came to our house for a meeting (Ed). She left her bike parked outside our door, unsupervised and unlocked. During the evening a policeman (a member of the crime reduction team) knocked on the door and asked if we were aware the bike was vulnerable and could be stolen. We were impressed by this response: its not like the good old days, doors open, goods on display - we need to be more aware.

Nicki Doubleday, our PCSO, explained in response to an email from me about this visit by the crime reduction team:

"The whole of Witham A shift including the Sergeant under my direction were working with members of Community Speed Watch and the parish council and NHW as part of Neighbourhood Watch week. We were carrying out a local objective called 4 VP trying car doors etc and speaking to the owners of insecure vehicles in relation to theft of and from motors."

Parish Councillors got less than polite reactions from some residents when spoken to, very politely and helpfully, about their vulnerable car standing outside with unlocked doors and open windows. They would have been the first to complain about police shortcomings had that vehicle been stolen or had items removed from it.

Rogue traders love open doors and windows Please be aware of persons who may knock at your door offering their services: roof repairs, garden services, hedge cutting, driveway repairs, and pressure washing driveways. **Never accept the services of persons who cold call at your door.** They can be very convincing and sometimes it is easy to be taken in by people who tend to target the most vulnerable within our communities.

Mobile phones

Mobile phones have become more of a necessity than an accessory, an attractive target for thieves.

Whether you use yours for business or chatting with friends, you won't want to lose important phone numbers and family snaps stored on your phone, so keep it safe. Follow our advice to keep your mobile out of reach of opportunist thieves

• Don't leave your mobile on show in your car.

• Don't leave your mobile on view on tables in pubs, cafes, restaurants and other public places.

• If you have a smart phone, think about activating the 'find my phone' app. It provides an accurate GPS location of the phone and gives the owner the option to instruct it to let off a loud alert even when in silent mode. Activating the app could help police trace your phone if it is stolen.

• Don't leave your phone unattended in jacket pockets and bags.

- Be discreet if you use your mobile in the street.
- Make sure you lock the keypad using a PIN number when you are not using your phone. It can't then be used to make calls if it gets stolen.

• Mark your phone, its battery and other accessories with your postcode using an ultraviolet marker pen. If your phone is stolen and recovered by police it will be easier to trace it back to you.

How burglars are using social media

Social media sites as Facebook are being used by burglars to target victims. They can locate your address from uploaded photos, status updates you've made from home. They use the information when you 'check-in' with the site, and target people using social media from airport lounges.

Where your subs go Mother's Union



ur speaker at the June meeting was Hilary Shallis who spoke about 'Where your SUBS go' - she thought we had a right to know. We moan when subscriptions seem to increase every year but when Hilary explained the ways in which they have to be divided between the different departments of the MU organisation, we began to understand more. 2011 was the last year for which she had the figures and, at that time, there were 83.000 members in the UK alone. 26% of the total income from these members goes for the upkeep of Mary Sumner House in London which controls the whole of the worldwide MU. This is a gigantic task and many of the staff are volunteers. The others work long hours for very low salaries but many expenses have to be paid including compulsory insurance, various conferences and meetings, plus administration costs of all kinds.

We were shocked to learn that when the MU hold their Diocesan Council meetings in Chelmsford Cathedral, it costs £85 per hour plus £60 for use of the organ and another £60 for an organist! It came as no surprise to learn that the MU ended 2011 with a deficit of £932. In 2012 there was a great effort to reduce the deficit and Diocesan and Deanery Officers were encouraged, with Marian Ketley our President, to get together and support each other in this aim.

Up until 1998 there used to be a worldwide three-day conference in London once a year for

which the MU paid all expenses. This however became untenable in the economic climate and had to be dropped. It has been replaced by conferences in different zones which are not always in the UK. Also, twice a year, two members are chosen to attend the United Nations meeting in the USA and their expenses are paid by central office.

We thanked Hilary for her very informative talk, and felt that she had made the boring subject of facts and figures much more interesting.
