Planning - all planning meetings are open to the public. Notification of these meetings will be erected in the village notice boards three clear days prior to each meeting.

The following applications have recently been made

Erection of one and a half storey detached dwelling with parking, garden amenity space and associated development including retrospective formation of a new vehicular access into the site at land adjacent to Oakleigh House, Crabb's Hill. Proposed side extension at Moor Gardens, Maldon Road. Application for a proposed lawful development certificate - erection of single storey side extension at 16 Remembrance Avenue. Conversion of a single dwelling to two dwellings and new dropped kerb at Cosycats, 5 Sportsmans Lane. Proposed two-storey front extension at 25 Gleneagles Way. Application for prior notification for proposed demolition of garages at garage 2822 Swan Close - permission is not needed.

Application for variation of Condition 2 of approved application 14/00488/FUL - change in appearance and materials at land rear of Swan View, The Street. Reinstatement of original vehicular crossover to provide a separate access from Maldon Road to the property at Longfields, Maldon Road. Proposed new entrance at Smallands Cottage, Spring Lane. Replacement of four front facing windows with replicate timber casement windows, strip existing render, treat exposed timber and insert insulation re-render to match the existing render at Ann Cottage, The Green. Erection of single storey dwelling and adjust crossover, with parking on the frontage of number 12 at land rear of 12 Mortimer Road.

The following applications have recently been granted

Erection of single storey front extension, loft conversion including cat slide dormer to front and Velux rooflights to rear, reroofing existing roof with slate and rendering/colour washing the existing brick walls at 7 Glebefield Road. Erection of first floor side extension above existing extension and provision of render to front elevation of existing at first floor level at Glendale, Nounsley Road. Erection of single storey rear extension at 15 Laburnum Way. Extend single storey lean-to toward the rear of the property retaining existing width at Barns and Gate Farmhouse, Nounsley Road. Erection of replacement single storey rear extension at 40 Baker Avenue. Erection of first floor side extension, single storey rear extension at 22 Chestnut Avenue. Erection of two-storey side extension at 8 Willow Crescent. Erection of 60 bed care home development and associated car parking and landscape gardens plus the demolition of existing car home at Willowmead Nursing Home, Wickham Bishops Road.

The following applications have been refused

Application for approval of reserved matters following outline approval 15/00865/OUT - erection of 3 bed dwelling house on land rear of The Limes. Replacement of existing mobile home with single dwelling at Paddock farm, Spring Lane.

Dog fouling - the Parish Council is considering using CCTV with an aim to prosecute anyone who does not remove their dog foul, and are also in the process of purchasing pink spray to highlight any dog foul left.

This will be carried out for a period of three months. If the problem persists, the parish council may consider a 'Dogs on Lead' policy only on the Strutt Memorial and Nounsley recreational grounds.

Braintree District Council car park survey

Project Centre Ltd has been appointed by Braintree District Council to carry out a study of off street car parking in Braintree and Witham, including station parking arrangements at Hatfield Peverel and Kelvedon. The purpose of the study is to determine how well the current parking arrangements serve local residents, businesses and visitors, and what changes may be desirable to satisfy needs over the next fifteen years to meet parking demands generated by the development of up to 16,000 new properties in Braintree District.

As part of the study BDC wishes to engage with local stakeholders to understand how the current parking arrangements serve the community as a whole. We would therefore kindly ask you to take the time to complete our on line survey which can be found at https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/BRAINTREE2016 This informal consultation will run from 27th July for 3 weeks until Wednesday 17th August 2016, please ensure you submit your completed questionnaire on or before 17th August. The questionnaire is split into each area of interest; town centres, railway stations and industrial estates, you do not need to answer every section if your area of interest only relates to a specific town centre, railway station or industrial estate.

UK Power Network

On 6th September a new national phone number 105 will be launched by electricity network operators for customers to call should they need to report or get information about a power cut in their area. Key points to note about this service are: dialling 105 will put customers through to their local electricity network operator, the company that manages the cables, power lines and substations that deliver electricity into homes and businesses in their area. They can also contact them by phone or via their website, and most network operators are on social media too. 105 is a free service for people in England, Scotland and Wales. Customers can call 105 no matter who they choose to buy electricity from and can call 105 if they spot damage to electricity power lines and substations that could put anyone in danger. If there's a serious immediate risk, they should call the emergency services too.

The ditch along the footpath from Bennett Way to St Andrews Road has been cleared and the verge and banks strimmed and cut and the area looks really tidy. A shame someone has filled the public litter bin with their household rubbish and dumped an old paddling pool.

Would dog walkers please clear up after their dogs. The small area of grass at the rear of the Library/Hadfelda Square behind the hedge is one large dog toilet. It may be out of sight to most but is still a public area and not just for dogs to use at their owners convenience. Please clear up after your dog and use bins provided. This area is kept free of rubbish by a team of litter pickers: it is not their responsibility to clear up dog poo.

NDP progress report - where are we?

The draft Plan, Landscape Character Assessment and the Hatfield Peverel and Nounsley Character Assessment to support the Plan were submitted to BDC on the 13th June for the Statutory Environmental Assessment (SEA) screening. BDC instructed Essex County Council to carry out the screening who advised that an SEA was not necessary. BDC then consulted with Historic England, Natural England and the Environment Agency (the Countryside Agency is now part of Natural England) under Regulation 9 lasting five weeks finishing on 12th August.



The public consultation period under Regulation 14 will therefore commence on the 15th August which means that the draft Plan will finally be out for residents to comment upon. The draft Plan can be viewed on the Parish Council website www.essexinfo.net/hatfieldpeverel and hard copies will be available in the Library, Dentist, Community Association lounge bar and the Church hall. If you wish a copy to be emailed then do contact hatfieldpeverelplan@gmail.com

Please take time to read the draft Plan and let us have your comments on the policies by completing the questionnaire included with the Review so that these may be addressed before the draft Plan is submitted for examination.

The questionnaire needs to be returned by the **30th September** via the NDP post boxes located in the Library, Upsons Farm Shop, Hadfelda Hair, Co-op, Maharaj, Dentist, Community Association lounge bar, and St Andrews Church, by email to the NDP, the Parish Clerk or to the team at the planned drop in events to be held on the rec on Monday 15th August from 2.30 until 7.30pm and again on Wednesday 21st September from 8.30 until 12.30pm. A further copy can be downloaded from the Parish Council website or email hatfieldpeverelplan@gmail.com

A questionnaire was also prepared for Party in the Park in relation to non planning issues. The questionnaire is ongoing, and we would again ask you to let us have your comments either via email or the NDP post boxes. The forms can be found in the Library and the Co-op or by downloading from the Parish Council website or email the NDP.

Copies of the Landscape Character Assessment and Hatfield Peverel and Nounsley Character Assessment are now in the Library. If you would like to purchase a copy, the LCA is £5.50 and the HP&N CA is £4.00. The price is purely to cover printing costs. We have some copies available but are happy to take orders. They can also be viewed on the Parish Council website.

100th Anniversary of the Battle of the Somme

At 0730 on the morning of 1st July 1916, three blasts of the whistle started the bloodiest day in British military history with 19,240 killed and a further 38,230 wounded, all on that day.

To commemorate this tragic day, a service of remembrance was held on Friday 1st July 2016 at St Andrews Church, Hatfield Peverel.

The service commenced at 0730 with three blasts of the whistle and a procession to the altar by the Royal British Legion Standard Bearer, Graham Bushby. Then followed a time of prayer and reflection led by Fr Stephen, the last post played by the Salvation Army, the two minutes



silence and the exhortation led by Lt Col Derrick Louis, lighting of candles and the reading of the 'Short but terrible rush' by Henry Louis.

'The short but terrible rush...' From the Diary of Private William Roberts, 18th Durham Light Infantry, 1 July 1916.

Opened a violent bombardment on the German lines. 7am a village blown up by our mine and 7.30am advance started. We were the 4th Battalion to go over, which we did about an hour later.

The short but terrible rush through the fierce curtain fire with men falling on all sides I shall never forget. High explosive shells fell all round us. The sights I saw are too terrible to write about and men almost blown to pieces were lying side by side.

Unable to proceed further, the order to retire was given and I thanked God that I came through the terrible ordeal unhurt. I went to work in our front line at night but had to come away as it was almost blown to pieces. There again I saw dead and wounded lying side by side. Some were moaning and others had so far lost their reason that they were laughing and singing.

Private Roberts was killed at Etrun, Pas-de-Calais on 15 June 1917, age 23.

The winner was a white wine from Romania, runner-up a Portuguese red. Ironically, these were the two cheapest wines tasted, from Asda at just over £4 a bottle.

July's meeting was the now-traditional walking treasure hunt, organized this year by the super-efficient team of Nick and Jill Shakespear, and featured the old-world charms of Little Waltham. The hunt finished at the recently-refurbished White Hart, where we enjoyed an excellent supper. Diocesan Retreat House Pleshey

Mother's Union - Jean Ashby

Our June speaker was Mr Stuart McCredie, Retreat House manager, who gave us an interesting talk on its history and the events that take place there. The original house was occupied in the 19th century by nuns of the Congregation of the servants of Christ, but was deemed unsuitable and pulled down. A new building opened in 1909 as a convent. In 1919 it was rented from the nuns by the Diocese of Chelmsford and opened as the first retreat house in England, offering a place for rest and spiritual reflection. In 1927 it was bought by the Diocese of Chelmsford: it comprises the main house, linked gatehouse, a chapel, and the Evelyn Underhill meeting room - named after the 20th century spiritual writer who was instrumental in the early days of the life of the retreat house. Today it is a valuable resource for people across the Chelmsford Diocese, where they can come to reflect upon their daily lives, to seek God and to be refreshed.

There is a varied programme of courses and the house offers overnight accommodation and meals. It is always trying to improve facilities to meet requirements of 21st century pilgrims. Ongoing work includes the installation of a lift from ground to first floor. As Mr McCredie said, supporting Pleshey is a tangible way of supporting the spiritual life of the Diocese.

Some of us have visited Pleshey and seen what a pleasant, comfortable and restful a place it is, a valuable asset for our Diocese.

Methodist Church

The tablecloth that was embroidered with villager names as a gift to a Minister in 1961 has now had some in-depth investigation done to identify more about the lives of the villagers connected to the Church. Thanks to sisters Pauline Edwards and Jean Ashby (née Jennings) and friend Anne Williams (née Lewin) we now have memories of most of the names shown. We displayed the cloth and the report at our stall at Party in the Park on the 9th July together with more information on our Church activities and the charities we have supported recently and hope to support in the future. This was amongst a huge display of cakes for sale which disappeared as the afternoon progressed and our very contented goats, Ruby and Tinkerbelle, who enjoyed all the attention and petting.

'Donate a Bra campaign' - don't burn them, give them to us!

She then uses the money earned from the sales of the donated bras to begin her planned business and another lady will receive a delivery of bras to start the process again.
