A blessing for sun lovers but not allotmenteers, gardeners, farmers Allotment and growing news - Drew Price HPAA New Site letting officer, www.hpaa.org.uk

Last year, July had only four days of recorded sunshine – this year, well you know how much we've had. A blessing for those who love it and want a warm holiday feeling. But it has not been a blessing for farmers, gardeners and those who hope to produce crops whether for personal or commercial use.



At the HPAA we too are struggling to keep our crops alive. Top tips for managing this type of drought situation are:

Mulch on flower beds and around shrubs and trees to stop moisture from evaporating during dry spells.
Raise height of lawn mower blades, and use a lawn sprinkler (*if permitted!*) in the evening for at least 30 minutes.
In dry conditions, water container plants at least once a day in the evening to reduce evaporation.
Try to avoid watering plant leaves in direct sunlight because they can become scorched, particularly when they have hairy foliage. Water soil at the base of the plant to soak the roots.

We are doing really well: participating in Party in the Park (*the delightful painting above came third in the competition 'Hatfield Peverel in Bloom' see page 9*), and hosting our own two-site competition day with many members showing well in the judging for best plot, best newcomer, best sunflower, and best scarecrow. The winners were all our great members who attended, shared time, coffee, nibbles, stories with each other and enjoyed the morning.

For those garden enthusiasts in the village who might need more room, exercise or a chance to meet some likeminded folk, come see us re an allotment plot. There are only a couple left. Call me, Drew at 0780 361 5062, or Simon Reed, 07990 580985.

Cheshire, here we come

In July the Horticultural Society's summer break was centred in Frodsham, Cheshire

Our hotel was set on top of a hill overlooking the Cheshire plains and the Mersey estuary, a magical view both during the day and night when the sun sank red into the sea and lights sparkled in the clear evening air.

Clive had again chosen an exciting and different programme for us: from Moseley Old Hall at Fordhouses near Wolverhampton where a young Charles II fleeing capture from parliamentarian soldiers, hid up in a priests hole until the coast was clear - to the extensive gardens of Arley Hall with its oldest double herbaceous borders iu the country dating from 1846. A marvellous garden, colourful to the extreme in spite of the dry conditions.

Day 3 our morning destination was Mount Pleasant, ten acres of landscaped gardens overlooking the Cheshire country. The extensive sculpture trail was an eye opener with a wide variety of different mediums, large and small, in wood and metal.

The Anderton boat lift on that afternoon was a special highlight. A Victorian piece of engineering,

put into service in 1875 and known as one of the seven wonders of the waterways, lifts boats between rivers Weaver and Trent and Mersey Canal. We enjoyed the boat lift and the canal trip that followed.

On our return journey we visited Ironbridge - much changed and enlarged since we took the children there a lifetime ago. We visited Blists Hill Victorian town (*Kitchen Cabinet, 4 Aug, BBC Radio 4, came from here*), set in the year 1900 with so much to see and do you could spend a week exploring the exhibits and reconstructions manned by appropriately dressed demonstrators and shopkeepers. A baker sold freshly baked loaves, a chemist remedies for a variety of ailments and the fried fish dealer supplied you with a tasty meal.

Another winner Clive. Wiltshire next year.

The group eased itself into the first two of the tasks we had set ourselves - to clear some of the sidegrowth from the path between the Duke of Wellington bridge and The Vineyards cottages, and from the hedge between the burial ground and the churchyard. We think we did a reasonable job and so far have had no adverse comments. We'd welcome any feedback from you.



Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) update

Following the recent Focused Changes consultation on the proposed amendments to Policies FI1 (Facilities and Infrastructure), HO1 (Design of New Developments) and HO6 (Allocation of the former Arla Site), Braintree District Council forwarded all comments received from the consultation to the Examiner in order for her to progress the Examination. The Focused Changes will be considered along with the representations made as well as those made at Regulation 16 stage.

Meanwhile the Examiner has drawn the NDP group's attention to a recent judgement of the Court of Justice of the European Union (CJEU) in Case C-323/17 People over Wind & Sweetman v Coillte Teoranta dated 12 April 2018, and Article 6(3) of the Habitats Directive.

The Examiner has asked if the Parish Council consider that the Hatfield Peverel NDP Habitats Regulation Assessment Screening Report (December 2017) is legally compliant in the light of the judgement. If it is considered not compliant, what work would be required to rectify this? The NDP group have been working alongside Braintree District Council, Place Services at Essex County Council and their own Consultant. Legal opinion has been sought by BDC, and it is anticipated that a response will be given to the Examiner very shortly.

Also, in relation to the Inquiry for Stonepath Meadow and Gleneagles Way, the Secretary of State has extended his decision date until 12 September 2018 to allow the main parties to make their representations in the light of this judgment as it is new material.

The Parish Council has consulted with its barrister and a response is being prepared for submission to the Secretary of State by 7 August.

The Secretary of State has also asked for representations and comment from the main Inquiry parties on the effect that the latest version of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) now released by the government may have on their position, and any effect it might have on his final conclusion. This is required by 15 August, and again the NDP group are seeking advice on a response.

New route for walkers on one of the years' hottest days Hatfield Peverel Walkers Graham Bushby 381472

In June we decided to complete the walk abandoned last month due to a burst water main in Heybridge. For the first time ever the six Hatfield Peverel walkers set out on a route that none of them had done before - and on one of the hottest days of the year. However, we did have detailed written directions and an Ordinance Survey map.



From Daisy Meadow car park in Heybridge Basin, we walked alongside the lock gates and noticed the new sea gate was in the closed position. Then along the sea wall, turning left at Mill Beach Public House. We then headed towards Chigborough Nature Reserve. Having passed through the reserve, which included a wooded marshy area, we skirted a lake and arrived at Drapers sports field. In view of the heat we took a shorter route back to Heybridge Basin, than originally planned, via St George's Field. Here we were joined in the tearoom by two guests where everyone enjoyed well deserved sandwiches (crab the favoured filling). The walk covered four and a half miles and took two hours.

Many thanks to Les and Dave for devising the walk and providing accurate and detailed directions.

The heat beat us for the July walk which was cancelled but hopefully in August, on the last Thursday of the month 10am village hall car park, it will be back to normal (unless we've all melted away!).

Our June speaker, Sally Hepher from the Woodland Trust had us all guessing as she produced a selection of leaves to be identified. As well as beautiful and useful, trees provide habitats for wildlife and just one oak supports a thousand other species. Quite amazing. The trust aims to protect existing woodlands and plant new ones. Essex has only 4% tree cover and there is only 13% in the rest of the UK. Over the past 45 years the trust has planted 32 million trees.

To comply with the new data protection act, all members had to agree to their details being kept and this has to be recorded in the minutes.

'Your favourite Recipe' - what a mouth-watering evening members enjoyed in July. Frances Harper demonstrated 'Wholefood Cookery' and the church hall was filled with delicious aromas. A passion for amateur radio

Mothers Union - Jean Ashby

In June our friend John Strange gave a fascinating account of his passion for amateur radio. At 10 his Father showed him how to build a simple 'Crystal Set' radio. It required no power to operate just a long wire for an antenna, a good earth connection, a few other simple components, and a pair of earphones. He could listen to BBC, Radio Luxembourg and other stations far away.

In 1973 he passed the Radio Amateurs exam but life and work took over, and it wasn't until he retired that he applied to Ofcom for an Amateur Radio licence to 'get on the air'. From the equipment in his radio shack in his back garden John can make contact with amateurs world wide. Every radio station has its own call sign and is licensed to broadcast on specific frequencies. The same applies to amateur radio; they have their own call signs to indicate which country they are transmitting from and the location of the station. John's equipment has a maximum power output of 100w and he can make contact with amateurs as far away as Australia and New Zealand. With all this technical equipment, world-wide reception still relies on activity on the surface of the sun! The more sun spots the clearer the reception.

John brought pieces of his equipment to show us and an album of postcards sent to him from contacts he has made all over the world.

In July a Street Pastor from Chelmsford told us about his work. There is no meeting in August.

Park Life

It's a sunny day in August and an ambulance is on its way to a house: it weaves its way swiftly, blue lights flashing, until it reaches a long queue. The traffic tries to move out of its way – with difficulty – a line of cars are parked haphazardly along the verge, bumpers jutting into the road. The ambulance gets through, passing the cause of the disruption - a delivery lorry on double yellow lines, halting the flow and angering motorists.

Turning into a quiet neighbourhood, the ambulance's journey gets harder as it squeezes past cars left on junctions and in restricted areas. The paramedics go the rest of the way on foot -30 minutes later than planned. They wouldn't have got on the driveway anyway, someone had parked across the dropped kerb access, causing an obstruction.

We're the North Essex Parking Partnership, NEPP for short. Led by Colchester Borough Council and including Epping Forest, Harlow, Uttlesford, Braintree and Tendring, NEPP manages parking enforcement in all six areas. We introduce new parking restrictions, enforce the ones that exist, represent the local area in parking decisions and much more.

Our Civil Enforcement Officers look for cars parked where they're causing danger or inconvenience:

- * on double or single yellow lines
- * in resident permit zones when they don't have a permit
- * in parking bays for longer than permitted
- * and in other places where there are restrictions.

From time to time, we deal with different matters. A couple of months ago, an officer was on his way in the direction of Newport when he witnessed a serious road accident. The officer stayed with the driver for over an hour, awaiting an air ambulance. A rare incident, but we help wherever we can.

Nobody likes getting a parking ticket - we don't like giving them either! If you think a Penalty Charge Notice is wrong, you can appeal and we'll always consider it fairly. If you see us out and about and you aren't sure where to park, please feel free to ask. Our officers are trained to give directions and advice, we prefer to help rather than give a penalty charge notice.

For this reason, we work to inform people about considerate parking. We post motorist tips/advice on our Twitter account, @nepp_parking, and give presentations to parish councils and other organisations.
