

Hatfield Peverel over eighty years ago - times past and times present

On the front cover of this Review is a copy of a map used by Miss Hope in her book The Township of Hatfield Peverel published in 1930. You may have a copy of this history, or seen it in the library. It is fascinating reading of times long passed but of particular interest is the map on the inside front cover depicting the village as it was in - perhaps - the late 1920s. Do the sums - it makes this village scene over eighty years old. The initials MN Gepp are inscribed on the left hand corner of the drawing but there is no acknowledgement of the artist inside. Gepp and Sons are solicitors in Chelmsford, where they have been since the 1700s. We are now very aware that Hatfield Peverel, already much changed since the 1930s, will change again. That is progress. But if we want to have a say in how it looks in the future we must get our heads together and make sure the increase in housing allocations does not spoil our rural outlook. **Read the article below and on page 8. Your help is needed.**

Do you want a say on the future growth of your village?

The government wants an increase in the original housing allocations for Hatfield Peverel and surrounding towns and villages and Braintree District Council is now working on a revised Local Plan. The Parish Council has started the formulation of its own Neighbourhood Development Plan to provide an input to Braintree DC that will consider the needs of our village in terms of future housing. **Input from the whole community is needed to achieve this goal.** The explanatory article on page 8 gives the background to the original Local Development Plan, and where we go from here, with information on public drop-in sessions and workshops taking place between now and late March. **The last of these on Wednesday 25th March, Church hall 7.30pm, will be addressed by Clare Wright, a consultant from 'Locality', an organisation assisting on local planning issues.**



Our village is becoming a parking lot

As I am sure you are all aware we have a number of parking problems in the village, mostly as a result of commuter parking for the station. In recent weeks several residents have contacted the Parish Council to ask what action we can take. The answer is that whilst it is not within our power to take our own action we can offer help, support and advice. With respect to this there are currently two applications to Braintree District Council for Traffic Regulation Orders which have been lodged by residents.

Both are requests for one hour parking restrictions, the first in The Street opposite D's Diner, and the second in Toulmin Road which also asks for resident permits to be granted.

Braintree has passed the applications to the Parish for our opinion, whilst making it clear that neither scheme will proceed unless supported by a majority petition of local residents.

I am therefore making this appeal for any resident interested either in facilitating or participating in such a petition to get in touch with me, Garry Cockrill, for the Parish Council, see contacts above.


We currently have one resident willing to help out in The Street but need more volunteers to come forward. **I should point out that the Parish will not be organising this petition but we can put interested parties in touch with one another in order that the residents can raise their own petition.** This is the action that has also been recommended by the North Essex Parking Partnership.

On the plot at the allotment

The busiest time of year is nearly upon us, spring is definitely around the corner and you can see buds appearing everywhere so now is the best time to try and get ahead.

The most important thing is to get your beds in the best possible shape and ready to receive and this means incorporating some form of bulky feed. This can be in a number of different forms, but my favourite is well rotted horse manure. Riding stables will usually be glad to get rid of the stuff! But make sure any manure you use this time of year is well rotted otherwise the rotting process will use up valuable energy from the soil. One really great soil food is seaweed and we live close enough to the coastline to make this a viable alternative and an excellent feed. Seaweed is a superb soil balancer - dig it in or spread around growing plants and crops. Make sure you only collect loose seaweed. Any well-rotted compost from the compost heap will add to your soils structure and health but this can contain weed seeds so mulching or hoeing will be the order of the day to keep on top of the weeds early on.



Using pelleted or powdered feeds will be OK for a couple of years but you can't beat compost, manure and seaweed as these not only feed the soil but aid its structure to retain moisture in the dry months.

To chit or not to chit that is the question?

My seed potatoes came at the end of January and the big chitting job is in full swing. This should be done in a frost free light room around 10°C is best. There is a lot of debate on chitting whether it really is worth the effort so last year I did a little experiment with my first earlies by doing a row with chitted potatoes and a row with non-chitted using the same batch of seed potatoes, and the chitted row were three weeks earlier and had more tubers under the tops.

This year I have another experiment with my potatoes. A row of main crops will be chitted, seed potatoes cut in half doubling my seed potatoes. This will be interesting to compare the results against a whole seed potato, I'll be comparing them for size and quantity. I'll keep you informed - I wonder if it will affect the yield?

If this article inspires you to take up growing vegetables and you don't have an allotment, we have a few plots available, get in touch and you will never look back, gardening is in my opinion the most rewarding form of exercise, it keeps you fit, with fresh air in your lungs, great food on your table, sustaining indeed!

Planning

All planning meetings are open to the public. Notification of these meetings will be erected in the village notice boards three clear days prior to each meeting.

The following applications have recently been made

Erection of three dwellings at land adjacent to Walnut Tree Cottage, The Street. The Parish Council does not support this application; erection of a first floor bedroom extension at 99 Church Road; erection of single storey front extension, extension to front of existing garage and conversion of rear garage to shower room at 23 Ranulph Way; improvement to main farm access at Wood End Farm, Hatfield Road, Witham; erection of five dwellings at land adjacent to Ambleside, London Road. The Parish Council does not support this application.

Application for removal or variation of condition 2 of approved application for erection of stable block, hard standing and new tree planting at Belvoir, 35 Sportsmans Lane; erection of 1 dwelling on land east of Maldon Road. The Parish Council does not support this application. Erection of single storey rear extension at 1 Rock Cottages, The Vineyards; change of use of land for the stationing of containers for storage purposes and the storage of building materials, machinery and equipment at land adjacent to bungalow at Bovingtons Farm; demolition of an existing double garage and erection of 2 bay cart lodge with workshop area at The Nook, Wickham Bishops Road.

The following applications have been approved by the District Council

Demolition of existing outbuilding, internal alterations and raising part of the rear first floor roof at 1 The Limes, The Street; conversion of garage into annexe at Woolsmore, Maldon Road; erection of two storey side extension at 26 Gleneagles Way, Hatfield; conversion of garage to habitable space, new porch roof canopy, external cladding with render and brick plinth and new boundary wall at Scheherazade, Nounsley Road; erection of conservatory at 16 The Green; change of use of two bedroom dwelling into office accommodation for eight people at Brettons Field, 4 The Street; erection of single storey rear extension and internal alterations at Midmar House, Nounsley Road; application for a non-material amendment following grant of planning permission to two rear single storey extensions at Crofton, Station Road.

The following application has been refused by the District Council

Erection of a one bedroom bungalow for a disabled person at land adjacent to 63 Church Road.

Tree preservation orders granted

Work to trees at 5 DeVere Close, and Haven Court, Swan Close.

Council tax 2015/16

The Parish Council has been advised there will be a decrease of approximately 15% to grant and localism funding for the coming financial year. The decision was therefore made at the January Parish Council meeting to increase the Parish rate by 3.3%. This equates to an increase of approximately £1 per annum to council tax band D households.

We feel this increase is necessary in order to maintain services that the parish council is responsible for such as litter picking, street lighting and grass cutting throughout the parish. This increase has been kept as low as possible due to the parish council using some of its reserves for one off projects planned during the coming year, the largest being the purchase of a new burial ground and the completion of a Neighbourhood Development Plan. **Further information can be found on the website or by contacting the Parish clerk.**

Neighbourhood Development Plan

The Parish Council has started the formulation of a Neighbourhood Development Plan that will consider the needs of our village in terms of future housing. (In that process) input from the whole community is needed to achieve the goal. This has arisen from the need to provide an input to a revised Local Plan that Braintree District Council are currently working on, necessitated by the increase last year in national house building targets by central government. There is a comprehensive explanation of the reasons for this, and the process that the parish council is adopting to prepare our plan on page 9/the following page. The item includes the dates of public information drop-in sessions and workshops that take place between now and late March.

Neighbourhood Development Plan - see editorial

Do you want to have a say on how the growth of your village is managed in the future? If so, why not get involved in the Steering Group to be formed under the new Executive Neighbourhood Development Plan Committee?

Braintree District Council produced a draft Local Development Plan last year. This was not submitted to the Planning Inspectorate as the Government now wants an increase in the original housing allocation - even more growth planned for the district.

Braintree District Council is developing a new Local Plan, and to achieve its housing targets many parishes will be affected by an increase in development. This includes Hatfield Peverel. Last autumn the District Council made a call for sites from developers and landowners, and approximately 300 sites across the district were received including thirteen for Hatfield Peverel and Nounsley. **The results can be viewed at www.braintree.gov.uk/callforsites**

On 12th January BDC's new Local Plan Sub Committee approved the Local Plan Issues and Scope Consultation Document for public consultation. The consultation period is for six weeks and will commence on 26th January. This is one of the first stages of producing a new Local Plan, and is the first stage of public participation.

The Parish Council is taking the opportunity NOW to develop a Neighbourhood Plan that considers the needs of our village. Input from the whole community is needed to achieve that goal. When the plan is made it will become a legal document, and will be used in planning applications by both Braintree District Council and the Parish Council.

There are three stages in the process of Neighbourhood Planning, Milestone 1 is in progress now

Milestone 1 An Executive Committee was formed under the Parish Council and an application submitted at the beginning of January to Braintree District Council for the Designated Area being the whole of the Parish of Hatfield Peverel and Nounsley. The six week consultation period commenced on the 22nd January.

Milestone 2 To prepare the plan the Steering Group will over the coming year ask to visit clubs and organisations to bring to attention the need to formulate a Neighbourhood Development Plan for the village, and to obtain your views. Surveys will be carried out: the first took place at the end of January and you are urged to complete and return it by 16th February. There will also be public meetings, workshops, drop in events, as well as the usual monthly Parish Council meetings, the Review, and the Parish Council website and notice boards will keep you up to date with information.

Can the Citizen's Advice Bureau help you?

Terry Bard, our first speaker of the year gave us a talk on the Citizen's Advice Bureau - Witham Office. There are 338 bureaux with 6,000 paid staff and 21500 volunteers. Advice is free, confidential and independent. It was set up in 1939 when they covered things like: ration books, evacuation, homelessness and tracking lost members of a family due to the war. Nowadays it's more likely to be about Benefits, debt, housing, finances, tax and legal problems that are top of the list.

2.1 million people were helped with 6.6 million problems last year, for example, being made redundant can cause more problems for clients - loss of housing, debt, and relationship difficulties. 33% of them were regarding benefits, 29% debts, 8% housing. He told us a whole load of interesting facts about CAB. For instance, I did not know that they would go out to people with a disability.

They feed back to the government things that are making peoples lives more difficult due to new laws or legislation. They are also associated with Consumers Direct and Trading Standards so if a problem has been highlighted by their clients the relevant group can be alerted. It is a voluntary organisation and a worthwhile one to donate to if you ever find yourself in a spot of difficulty with legal jargon, forms to fill in, or problems with the Tax man, do give them a ring - they are very helpful!

Taking animals - especially dogs - into residential homes is great therapy for the residents and on 25th February Helen Beard will talk to us about Pets as Therapy (PAT). The pets have to be approved. On 25th March David Vroobel's talk is on The magic and beauty of diamonds and other precious stones.

Two interesting subjects, why not come and join us in the village hall, 7.45 for 8am. We always meet on the fourth Wednesday of the month and everyone is welcome.

News from St Andrews

On occasions like these we realise our church isn't as big as we think it is!
