Stone Path Meadow - the big one

A big thank you to everyone (about 125 people) who came along yesterday morning (2nd October) to show their support against the development of our greenfield sites - Stone Path Meadow. There was a lot of green, and a lot of cake. Thank you to all the people who helped out in advance and on the day. *On the front cover is a collage of some of the photographs taken on this - can I say - historic morning, the top shot from a drone flying above the villagers.*

The next one is the big one - Tuesday 11th October at Braintree District Council, Causeway House, Braintree, CM7 9HB, 7.15pm. The agenda is now on BDC's website along with the planning officer's recommendation - which is that the planning application 16/00545/OUT land south of Stonepath Drive (Stone Path Meadow) is APPROVED. On 11th October the district councillors will vote on whether to accept the planning officer's recommendation or not.

Councillor's can vote against the planning officer's recommendation, which is what they did on 25th May when this site was rejected from the 'call for sites'. We saw on this date just how important it was to have members of the public there so that councillors could see the strength of feeling against this development. If **you can attend on 11th October it could make all the difference.**

A fter the 'drop in' events, workshops, visits to clubs, meetings with our consultant and BDC, and the tremendous amount of work carried out by the policy writing team, the draft plan was finally ready for public consultation on Monday 15th August. The consultation period was for six weeks ending on 30th September. During this time the NDP group held two successful 'drop in' events on the Rec which we hope residents who visited found helpful.

Questionnaires were collected from post boxes around the village during and at the end of the consultation, and also via email including comments from statutory consultees and developers. All comments were put into Survey Monkey, and the Police's are now currently being reviewed. It is anticipated to have an amended draft plan ready for our meeting with BDC on 22nd November.

The next step is to draft a Basic Conditions Statement and Consultation Statement to submit with the draft plan to the examiner in the New Year.

Proposed side extension at Moor Gardens, Maldon Road. Demolition of and replacement of Mayfield Cottage on land adjacent to Wood End Farm. Erection of single storey front extension, loft conversion including catslide dormer to front and Velux rooflights to rear, re-roofing the existing roof with slate and cream/colour washing the existing brick walls at 7 Glebefield Road. Proposed demolition of six existing buildings and erection of replacement workshop building at Countryside Leisure Ltd, Maldon Road. Application for removal of Condition 2 of approved application 07/01074/FUL (erection of annexe for current occupant of main dwelling to reside within domestic curtilage) – lifting of tied condition at Oakford Farm, Nounsley Road. Conversion of existing storage/workshop to 2 bedroom annexe at Berwick Place, Terling Hall Road. Infrastructure application for the provision of primary road network for Phase 1 with associated footpaths, cycleways, necessary drainage infrastructure including a foul water pumping station, and other minor access roads where appropriate at land adjacent to Lodge Farm, Hatfield Road, Witham. Erection of extension to replace existing conservatory at 6 Ranulph Way. Erection of two storey rear extension at 33 Willow Crescent.

Change in appearance and materials at land rear of Swan View, The Street. Conversion of single dwelling to 2 dwellings and new dropped kerb at Cosycats, 5 Sportsmans Lane. Replacement of four front facing windows with replicate timber casement windows. Strip existing render, treat exposed timber and insert insulation and re-render to match the existing render at Ann Cottage, The Green. Demolish workshop and vehicle sales buildings, cease vehicle sales use and erection of 7 two storey terrace dwellings and 2 detached dwellings, formation of new vehicular access on The Street, layout parking spaces and form private amenity area at Cowards Garage, The Street.

Road works in Church Road

17th October 2016 for approximately 6 weeks

Danned works by Essex Highways will affect **C**hurch Road between the eastern junction of Willow Crescent and De Vere Close. The work involves strengthening the masonry arch culvert carrying the watercourse between the pond to the rear of 107 Church Road and the larger pond in The Priory grounds. Church Road will be closed to all vehicles whilst the work is ongoing between these junctions of Willow Crescent and De Vere Close. Access to properties within these roads will be maintained by using Church Road on either side of the closure point. A signed diversion route will be in place throughout the closure period. Pedestrian access will be maintained. Working times: Monday to Friday 7am - 7pm. Periods of extended working may be required.

To minimise inconvenience to residents noisiest operations will be during the day. There will be occasions when it will be necessary to operate pumps for continuous periods to maintain the flow of the watercourse during periods when it is interrupted by the works. Advanced notification signage will be displayed on site around the beginning of October. Updated information regarding these repairs will be made available on the following web page as work progresses. Goodbye to the Salvation Army after 125 years in Hatfield Peverel Thank you to Geoff Jordan for giving us a glimpse of the Salvation Army's history in our village

A report in The War Cry, the Salvation Army's weekly newspaper, of April 19th 1890 stated that on Good Friday, Hatfield Peverel was the scene of a great united 'go' when the brass band from Chelmsford was reinforced with friends from Maldon and Braintree. These, together with the local people, caused the lanes to ring with salvation and joy. A united march and an open air service was held and afterwards a meeting took place in a tent attended by about two hundred and sixty people. *Opposite the band at Easter 1980 on the corner of Rye Close and Willow Crescent.*



On 26th February 1891 the Salvation Army (SA) was officially opened and recognised as corps number 1355. By this date local Salvationists were holding meetings in Danbury. Besides that, the War Cry of 25th April 1891 reported they had marched the three miles to Witham about thirty strong surrounded by a gang of roughs who formed a protecting party in case they were killed. In fact, on arrival everyone was delighted to see the SA and threw coppers and sixpences until they amounted to about fifteen shillings (75p)

From these historic events when the SA's first activities were conducted in the Workman's Hall (now the house Greenfields) at least four different buildings have been used. These have included a cottage on The Green and the wooden hall in Maldon Road. This hall was established on a piece of ground bought at auction in 1920 by Joe Coppin who was a member of the band. The last building acquired in the late 1970s was originally built in 1895 as The Parish Room. During the past 125 years Sunday worship has taken place and the sound of music, singing and Christian witness has been seen and heard in every street. Besides the local volunteers, who over the years have committed their time to the SA's cause, many full time officers (ministers) have been appointed here to provide leadership and pastoral care in the village.

A diary of 1911 belonging to the then bandmaster lists the names of sixteen members in the band. Their surnames show there were five Wrights, three Whites and one each of Wallace, Fisher, Coppin, Bones, Brock, Kirby, Leister and Spooner. Descendants of some of these men continued to be Salvationists in the twentieth century and up to the present day. Special anniversaries were held in 1951 (60 years) 1991 (100 years) and 2016 (125 years) when many past and present members and friends came together to give thanks and revive memories.

The 125th celebrations took place in May this year and people travelled from many places to be present and messages, including one from Melbourne in Australia, were received. Besides the Sunday worship meetings when the band and songsters (choir) participated in the services, a Sunday School was established which also had it's own band and singing group that functioned for many years. Youth clubs and ladies meetings were held mid week, together with coffee mornings and in more recent times a parent and toddler group was established.

Over the years the SA has not only enjoyed a friendly association with St Andrews Church and the Methodist Church in the village, but also with churches of many denominations in the surrounding area. Thank you for your support over the years and although the SA no longer has a presence in Hatfield Peverel it continues to work in 127 countries world wide as it endeavours in it's prime mission of giving help and hope where needed and to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Since he has been in Hatfield Peverel he has been organist at All Saints Feering, St Bartholomew's, Wickham Bishops and part-time here at St Andrew's since 2008. Since 2015 he has played parttime at St Peters, Gt Totham.

Paul is a member of both the Essex Organists and the International Organists Associations and has played the organ in churches in London, Oxford, Holland, Birmingham and Gloucester. He has played at Alexandra Palace, and also on the Chapel organ at Addington Palace, former home of the Archbishop of Canterbury. A story of English in England, beginnings
