Re-opening of Play Equipment

Risk Assessment

The Government recently announced that Play Parks could be re-opened on 4th July 2020 and subsequently produced guidance offering "practical advice on how these can be reopened and managed effectively to enable their use while minimising the transmission risk of COVID-19". The guidance is available at:

The guidance includes a requirement to "carry out an appropriate COVID-19 risk assessment". It is made very clear that "Failure to complete a risk assessment which takes account of COVID-19, or completing a risk assessment but failing to put in place sufficient measures to manage the risk of COVID-19, could constitute a breach of health and safety law". On that basis, this Risk Assessment takes each of the Key Principles as set out in the guidance and assesses whether or not practical arrangements can be put in place in the context of the open access Play Areas and MUGA Pitch in Hatfield Peverel.

	Gates to be secured open/removed enabling staff to enter the area to empty litter bins without encountering additional high traffic touch points.
	Play equipment and general maintenance contractor to be asked to provide a Risk Assessment concerning work in these areas in relation to Covid-19.

Conclusions

- The Council is asked to authorise the Clerk to purchase the necessary signage and request the handyman to install and maintain.
- The play areas will remain closed until the above-mentioned measures are in place.
- Information on the closure extension beyond 4th July 2020 will be put on the website and social media so that residents are aware; temporary signs will be put in place around the play equipment to this effect by the handyman.
- Residents will be informed once the play areas re-open.
- Recommendation is for the MUGA pitch to remain closed.
- A risk assessment will be carried out/reviewed whenever Government guidelines are updated.
- Risk assessment updated 23rd July following instigation of measures identified. Health and safety concerns raised regarding the side gate to the infant play area and its proximity to Maldon Road, therefore, the RA has been changed to reflect this.
- Risk assessment updated 7th August following the resolution to re-open the MUGA. Health and safety concerns raised regarding people scaling the fencing to access the MUGA. Health and safety risk deemed greater than risk from Covid-19.
