#### The Baker Avenue path has reopened!

s promised by Greenfields Community Housing, the path reopened on Friday 29th March, no doubt to the relief of many residents who regularly use it and were no doubt irked by the tiresome detour necessary during its closure.

A word of caution to all users: vehicles enter what is now Cutts Close from New Road, sharing the short approach road with pedestrians, and those going to numbers 3, 4 and 5 will cut across the pedestrian way to get to their parking areas. Please, drivers, cyclists and pedestrians, do take extra care.

Note that cycling is mentioned in the paragraph above. Assuming that the way will ultimately be incorporated on the Definitive Map it will not then be legal to cycle from where the access road enters the housing area to Baker Avenue. At the moment cyclists may do so but please - cycle responsibly. Turning left from this point – on a cycle - towards the rec is not legal because this a formal public footpath (FP18) on the Definitive Map.

As reported in the December Review, the application to Essex County Council for the way through from New Road to Baker Avenue to be added to the village's public footpath network on the county Definitive Map was submitted last September, and the officer responsible for processing it said at the time that she would not be commencing work on it until April 2013, ie, about now. I will report on the situation in the June issue of the Review.

#### **Bad weather stops play on allotments** David Goodey (01245 380389)

This diabolical weather continues to prevent progress on the allotments. The drought broke in April last year and, at the time of writing, seems to have been rain, wind, snow, cold, frost ever since. Plots are being dug over but little can be planted until the ground warms. Plenty of seed, etc, are being grown under glass in readiness.

We have installed two new water dipping tanks on the new site and one on the old to reduce walking distances. This is like coals to Newcastle in that it hasn't stopped raining for a year! The fly tipping near the footpath has been cleared and work parties continue to clear overgrown areas.

At our March committee meeting, Julia East was installed as HPAA secretary and Sean Pettit has joined our meetings to cover development of our website www.happ.org.uk as Webmaster (great title, I think I'll re-title myself Imperial Grand Wizard!). We also confirmed at our March meeting that we are fully let after a big effort to fill the many vacancies after the loss of twenty members last September due to the poor weather. We expect a few plots to become available this month as members fail to return from hibernation (happens every year) or fall foul of our 'non-cultivation' rule.

Alan Ingram (seeds) and Mick Seaman (Mr Potato Head) raised an amazing £416 from the sale of seeds and seed potatoes and are to be heartily congratulated.

Our Best Allotment competition and drinks and nibbles will be held on the new site on Saturday June 29th. One last appeal. Please don't let dogs foul the allotment areas. The problem is on the rise again.

Following the public consultation held by the District Council on Wednesday 30th January in the village hall, a public meeting was then held in the Church hall on 6th February. The turnout was tremendous with approximately 250 parishioners attending. The hall was overflowing. The Parish Council then held an extraordinary meeting on Tuesday 12th February when all councillors voted against the development of both HAT 14 (The Vineyards) and HAT 17 (Sorrel's Field). The Parish Council's comments were lodged with the District Council prior to the end of the consultation period on the 20th February.

Hatfield Peverel was not on the agenda for the meeting of the LDF panel on Tuesday 26th March in relation to the site allocations. The next meeting of the panel is shown on the District Council's website for Thursday 11th April.

## A warning to all dog walkers

This is a warning to all dog walkers to be vigilant when walking on the footpaths around the Priory grounds. My neighbour's dog was attacked as she walked from the cemetery down the footpath towards Sportsman's Lane, with her Labrador. Three large dogs came out of the Priory grounds, one knocked her to the ground, and savaged her dog. She was helpless in trying to pull the dog off, and her dog was left bitten and whimpering on the ground. She has reported it to the police, and they will be returning the choke chain collar she pulled off the attacking dog's neck to the owners. Her dog has two deep puncture wounds to his neck and ear, and is traumatised, as is she.

I also had a frightening moment when I was walking on the adjacent footpath on the field that leads up towards the cricket ground, when a large white English Bull terrier, whose name I believe was Archie, came tearing out of the Priory grounds, snarling towards my dog, who was on her lead. Fortunately a woman called his name he returned to her. It frightened me.

Subsequently, I have heard from other dog owners that their dogs have either been attacked or menaced by dogs that come out onto the footpaths. I know one of the owners has reported this to the dog warden. Another gentleman I see now never walks without a large walking stick, as his dog was also set on by one of these dogs.

One of the greatest joys for many of us is walking our dogs through the beautiful footpaths and country side we are blessed with in Hatfield Peverel. Whatever the weather, we are out every day, dog and owner enjoying the peace and quiet, and minding our own business.

Many of us are now wary of walking the footpaths surrounding the Priory grounds, or indeed, along Sportsman's Lane, for fear of these huge dogs coming out. I now do a detour to get to the river, which is not as enjoyable as the footpaths. Better safe than sorry?

Please be aware if you have the misfortune to have such an experience, report it to the police and the dog warden. No one wants these unruly dogs to come to harm, but the owners need to take responsibility for them, so the rest of us can walk in peace, not in fear.

## **Beating the Bounds – better luck this year?**

ast year this walk (see April 2012 edition) was cancelled because of the very poor ground conditions resulting from the unusual amount of rain in the weeks running up to the bank holiday, and because I sustained a severely sprained ankle whilst carrying out the recce walk two weeks beforehand. I plan to do the walk this Spring Bank Holiday Monday, 6th May, provided that we don't have a repeat of the conditions causing last year's to be cancelled.

Essentially the arrangements will be the same as planned for last year and given in both the Parish Magazine and the Review, ie we will start at 10am from where the public footpath towards Toppinghoe Hall leaves Terling Hall Road (about 50 yards beyond the railway bridge), walk by the railway towards Boreham for about a mile to pick up the parish boundary then follow it - as closely as possible - around the northern perimeter all the way to the Lynfield service station off the A12, just over 9 miles (or just under 15km). Including a stop for lunch about half-way round (remember to bring a packed lunch and water). It will take about 4½ to 5 hours.

For those who would like to come but feel that they can't manage nine miles, there are conveniently spaced escape (or joining) points around the route where we meet public roads - Terling Hall Farm after 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> miles, Whitelands on Terling Road after nearly 4 miles, Dancing Dicks Lane (by Dancing Dicks cottages) after 5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> miles. From there back to Lynfield is about a further 3 miles. You could join or leave at any of those points, joinings and rescue pick-ups being arranged by mobile phone whilst the walk is in progress.

To cut out the walk to the boundary start point you can get to within about 100 yards of it by car – ring me for details. For those that don't want to walk all the way to the start from the village, I have arranged that cars can be left in the parking area of Oakland Orangeries on Terling Hall Road, about <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile further on from the footpath finger post.

We don't have to re-establish the parish boundaries for real as in past times, the object is to have a day's enjoyable walking. (But we might read an extract of gospel at what I feel to be the only candidate for a gospel oak on the route - not the one on the right - that's the Hanwell Gospel Oak. See last April's Review for brief clarification). However, it won't be much fun walking in rain in boots heavy with mud and clay, so I will make the final decision as to whether the walk will go ahead the previous day, Sunday 5th May. Because of this uncertainty I suggest anyone considering coming on the walk should phone or email me in good time beforehand with their contact details. I will contact you on Sunday 5th to tell you whether or not the walk is on.

## Read this for your safety -Community Policing team

Emergency calls 999, non-emergency calls 101\*

House numbering - can we find your house? Not just the police but any emergency services and other legitimate callers have difficulty finding houses when the house name or number is either missing or hard to see. Invest in clear signage for your house name or number, it will assist in deliveries to your home, and in the more extreme cases could even save a life.

#### School absences – fraud alert Schools and parents will have been made aware of this fraud scam around unauthorised absence but we are repeating it for your safety.

Essex County Council is warning parents and schools to be aware of a fraud scam around unauthorised absences.

The Counter Fraud Team at Essex County Council in February was alerted that a parent of a pupil at an Essex school received a phone call purporting to be from the Education Welfare Service stating their child had not attended school that day and as a result they had to pay a fine of £340. The parent was asked to provide credit/debit card details so payment could be made over the phone.

The Education Welfare Service **does not phone parents demanding payment immediately over the phone.** Invoices/penalty notices are sent via the post by the Education Welfare Service and parents are then given the option to pay by phone. Although payments can be accepted over the phone, at no time would the Education Welfare Service demand payment immediately.

#### **Bogus police officers**

Detectives have renewed an appeal to **beware of bogus police officers** after two more incidents. Chigwell and Buckhurst Hill, where the incidents occurred, may seem many miles from here. Beware.

#### Police are linking five cases in less than a month in which telephone callers have posed as police to trick, or attempt to trick, elderly victims into revealing their banks details.

A couple from Buckhurst Hill had a three-figure sum of cash fraudulently removed from their bank account and were tricked into handing over a gold watch. The couple, in their 80s, were called by a man posing as a Metropolitan Police Officer based at Limehouse. He claimed the couple's bank account had been infiltrated and he needed their bank details to check. He said two officers would call at the couple's home to collect the cards. Two men arrived, took the cards and also tricked the couple into handing over the watch, claiming it could be used as part of the investigation.

#### Local burglaries

There have been several burglaries in the village during the past few months - take care, keep your doors and windows shut and don't answer the door to someone you don't know, its not worth it!




We would like to wish everyone a Happy Easter.

## **News from St Andrews**

How fickle is our weather? This time last year I was writing about drought, and the possibility of standpipes being introduced in the driest areas. This year, I am writing with plenty of water about (admittedly, some of frozen!) and temperatures struggling to reach 0 degrees Centigrade!

The main event - the benefits of which will be with us for a long time - is the new lighting in St Andrews. We are getting used to the programming that goes with it but there is no doubt it gives our beautiful building a 'lift'.



With the lighting, the whole church has been rewired to the most modern specifications and we have lots of plugs. No longer will the cross-bearer get tangled up in the wire that fed the Christmas tree lights. Thank you, people of Hatfield Peverel, for showing great forbearance when we had to have all services in the church hall for most of January and all February. I would like to thank the army of volunteers from church and village who cleaned the church ready for us to move back. You have done a fantastic job. The new lighting has exposed the sheer beauty of the roof beams and trusses as well as the fact that we will have to look afresh at the paint on some of our walls. We must not forget the dedication of John Strange, John Tomlins and Keith Pettit who have pushed this project through the usual red tape associated with an ancient building and kept an eye on it as it progressed.

Writing any church article at this time feels peculiar, because it is inevitably about Easter or beyond. As I write we are at the beginning of Holy Week and it just doesn't seem right to be writing about the resurrection, or events relating directly to it. It is almost like hearing the 'Amen' chorus of Handel's 'Messiah' after the overture, with the rest of the piece following!

By the time you receive this Review, we will be two weeks at least after Easter, in that period between Easter and Pentecost, called the Great 50 Days. The gospel readings for this period concentrate on both the resurrection appearances of Jesus in St John's Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles, which details how the early church began and spread, and many of the problems it faced, many of which are still with us!

At the beginning of February a special Bible Sunday service was held, entitled 'Promises, Promises' led by our Reader, Mary Daw. About fifty people came to the Church hall, which was set out like a cafe. It was a most thought-provoking service about using a book that we assume to be there but don't always take as seriously as we might. My thanks to Mary and her helpers for all they have done over the past year and continue to do.

For the Parish Lent course, we looked at 'Gospel Women' of which there are a surprisingly large number, following a book by Fiona Stratta.

Mothering Sunday was celebrated during March with the usual flower and simnel cake preparation on the Saturday ready for the service at 10.15am on the Sunday. This year the proceeds from the sale of the simnel cake went to 'Open Doors', an organisation devoted to helping persecuted Christians and their families throughout the world.

We have just had Palm Sunday. The evening was devoted to Stainer's 'Crucifixion' with St Andrew's Choir, members of Hadfelda Ladies Choir and members of our congregation and beyond. Under the baton (if she had one!) of Barbara Mason and the playing of Howard Southgate this well-loved piece was sung with the congregation joining in the hymns. Thanks to everyone who came.

The Annual Parochial Church meeting was on Sunday 14th April. This year the church electoral roll is revised completely so everyone needs to renew their membership. The April Parish magazine contains a tear-off form or they can be obtained in church.

On Sunday 21st April we hope to have a thanksgiving for the new lighting and the opportunities it provides. The 'Buy a Light bulb' fund is still open; we have to replenish the coffers to the tune of about £45,000. Thanks to those who have already generously donated money to this.

## **Mother's Union**

T n Februry members welcomed Mrs Christine Horton from the Children's Society who spoke L of the society's work countrywide and in the Chelmsford area. The society began in the late 19th century when a Sunday School teacher in South London, Edward Rudolph, was concerned numbers in his Sunday School class were slowly decreasing. He went into the streets to find his missing pupils and found many begging for food because of calamities that had befallen their families. He led a deputation to Archibald Tait, the Archbishop of Canterbury, with a plan to set up Church of England childrens' homes as an alternative to workhouses and orphanages. In 1881 a new organisation providing homes for waifs and strays - The Children's Society - came into being. The first home opened in Dulwich in 1882 with the premise that children should not become long term residents but go into foster care or adoption.

In the 1960s and 70s, due to social changes, the Society's work became more involved with supporting children within their own families and communities: during the 70s and 80s it introduced family centres offering advice plus play groups, youth clubs, and short term accommodation for young single mothers.

In Chelmsford there is a project called '114', the address in Springfield Road is currently the Society's HQ. Young trained counsellors go into schools to work with troubled youngsters who may relate and talk to the young people rather than their own parents. There are children who struggle to take care of invalid parents, families caring for a disabled child. The CS works with Social Services to support them all, and also lobbies for social justice, welfare provision etc. to help young people to think and act for themselves.

#### **5th March**

Carole Goddard was welcomed to our March meeting to talk about 'Civil Partnerships'. We are aware this is an emotive subject, but there is legislation going on in Parliament regarding same sex marriages which will affect us all.

At the moment the legal position is that any couple entering into a civil marriage in a Registry Office etc makes certain vows and can request their marriage be blessed in Church. A couple entering into a Civil Partnership make a public declaration of their love for each other but do not make any vows and cannot request a blessing by the Church. Gay couples feel they deserve to be considered on the same footing as heterosexual couples with regard to the state of marriage.

Carole was aware each individual would have their own views but she wanted to open our minds to consider all aspects. Firstly we have to remember we are God's children, all equally important in his eyes, and it is important to respect those with different views to us. We are instructed to 'Judge not that ye be not judged' and we are all made in God's image whether we are straight or gay.

The MU believes a happy marriage is commitment between a couple whether male and female or same sex. In the MU prayer we are asked to share God's love through encouragement, strengthening and support of marriage and family life. It does not define an ideal family. Carole very gamely answered the many questions.

We received a letter of thanks from Gladys Rowland's daughter for the flowers we sent to Gladys's funeral. She was a member of the MU for many many years, and a very dear friend. We sent a donation of £31 to the MU 'Make a Mother's Day Appeal.'

ooking back since the start of the year poor weather and illness amongst our members has curtailed activities in the church, and led to one Sunday Service being cancelled because of the snow – something we have avoided in recent bad winters. However on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> February we welcomed family and friends of Tracey and Mark to fill our Church to witness the blessing of Joshua. The proud parents chose the hymns and read a poem especially written by Tracey for her son. The well-known Bible passage from Corinthians illustrating the meaning of love reminded us that family and children are such a blessing.

This was re-enforced during our Mother's Day service on 10<sup>th</sup> March when our minister Rev Sue extended our thoughts not only to mothers but to fathers, parents, church family and wider community to show that our care, concern and responsibility covers this inclusive group.

As this report is being written the new catholic Pope is being presented to the crowds outside St Peters in Rome. In his first speech he talks of beginning a journey of love in mutual trust. This reminds us in Hatfield Peverel that we are part of a worldwide community of Christians and that reflects the words from the Hymn 'Brother sister, let me serve you' which we sang at our Mother's Day service on Sunday which has the words.



#### Local Salvation Army supports walkathon on human trafficking Major John Turner

The Salvation Army has a long history of working with vulnerable, marginalised people across the world, including victims of trafficking. Its anti-human trafficking work is on an international scale, and it has been protecting and caring for vulnerable victims since its beginnings in the 1880s. In England and Wales, the Salvation Army took responsibility for delivering the UK government's contract in July 2011 to manage support services for adult female and male victims of human trafficking. The specialist support programme is designed to preserve the dignity of victims, protect and care for them in safe accommodation, and provide access to confidential client-based support services..

A 70-year old man is heading into Hatfield Peverel as part of an 18-month sponsored walk across the UK to raise £100,000 for SA's work with homeless people and victims of human trafficking. Andy Peddle will visit our hall in Maldon Road on 2nd May dressed in top hat and tails as part of his walk to the majority of Salvation Army churches (Corps), Lifehouses and charity shops in the UK - 7,900 miles or 15 million steps.

Local Salvationists will organise a coffee morning, book and cake sale for 10am and expect Andy to arrive on his walkathon around 11.30am. All proceeds will go to support Andy's efforts. Local support for this colourful event is needed in both attendance and donations. Andy Peddle is a special kind of person helping to tackle a global problem.



## Scout and Guide HQ a major refurbishment

A race night (with a difference), a fun run and a barbecue, are all being organised to raise money for our refurbishment project.

The Scout and Guide groups need an estimated £50,000 to make essential alterations to our existing premises, built in 1970. The plans include two new toilets, a disabled toilet, a bigger kitchen and a new boiler. We have got strong support from organisations in the village that use our building but we do face difficulties with the ageing facilities, particularly in the winter because the boiler is not working reliably.

So far, almost £20,000 has been raised which

almost takes us to the critical half way mark. Fund raising activities by the units has achieved £5,000 and Essex County Council's Big Society Fund has awarded the group £15,000. Another £5,000 would give us a strong position from which to bid for further funding.
