Day Nursery to merge with the Infant School Julia Harris, Infant School secretary

We want to inform you of some very exciting news for our Infant School; we are currently in discussions with Essex County Council about lowering our admissions age to include nursery age children. Hatfield Peverel Day Nursery will be relinquishing their lease in August presenting us with this opportunity to become an Infant and Nursery school from September 2022.

Our vision is to deliver Nursery provision that dovetails with our already well established Early Years Reception Class, enabling a smooth transition into school life. As part of our school, the nursery children will also benefit from access to all our resources and external areas, increasing their range of experiences. We look forward to developing a relationship with the current nursery staff, sharing expertise and knowledge for a strong foundation and bright future for the children.

As part of this process, we ran a four-week consultation -- a short anonymous Google survey - and are now considering the responses.

What to say about the appalling news coming out of Ukraine?

There are local efforts within our community to bring aid the Ukrainian people. We know of one, Hope and Aid Direct, an Ingatestone based charity. (You will find a number of other less formal initiatives on Facebook Community Hub.) Your editors 'missed the boat' to donate any items Hope and Aid Direct had asked for but they have welcomed financial donations to fund shipments of aid items out to Slovakia.

Ron and Marel Elliston put out an appeal locally and gathered the resulting donations from our community. Marel takes up the story:

We have all been horrified by the news from Ukraine and many people have been moved to contribute to various charities with donations of much needed aid. An Ingatestone-based charity which started in 1999 to help those suffering from the after effects of the war in the Balkans is Hope and Aid Direct (HAAD) which is run by Charles and Bev Storer. As soon as news became apparent of the dire refugee situation in the countries bordering the Ukraine, HAAD volunteers visited Moldova, Romania and Poland to assess the situation and decide what the charity could most usefully provide.

The refugee's most desperate need was for food and an appeal went out to the charity's supporters around the country, to which many in Hatfield Peverel also kindly responded. Two 7.5 ton trucks, one of which was driven by Charles and Bev, and a 40 ton artic (driven by volunteers) left the UK on 2nd April en route to Uzhhorod in Slovakia, just over the border from Western Ukraine. The trucks were loaded with food, both tinned and dry items, and, among other things, sanitary goods (including nappies, dental products, hand gel etc), solar chargers, sleeping bags and disinfecting machines. This aid will be taken directly over the border into Ukraine and distributed into those areas most affected by the war and in the greatest need.

A big warm welcome

We are indeed living in a crazy world we never could have envisioned. From Global to national and even local, there is a myriad of things happening. Here, in Hatfield Peverel, we are seeing lots of new homes being built. We at the **HPAA** (Hatfield Peverel Allotment Association) wish to welcome all the many new residents to this lovely little Essex community. You will find much to do here in your spare time and this HP Review lists many of the options available within its articles.

One alternative we hope you may consider is to **join our allotment association**.

Allotments? They are small parcels of land rented to individuals usually **for the purpose of growing food crops.** It is a kitchen garden away from the residence of the user. We have **2 locations** to choose from!

In the UK, a quarter of all people said they had an allotment — for growing food that's fresh, tastes better, and for the exercise in digging, planting, and weeding, all the while socialising with other likeminded people.

Unsure of what to do or where to begin? Most allotment gardeners are only too happy to lend a hand and offer advice.

Some of the benefits

- 1 Eating healthily growing your own fruit and veg means you eat more healthily. Your **no** chemicals or sprays choice, means you'll enjoy fresh organic fruit and vegetables without the hefty 'organic' supermarket price tag.
- 2 **Saving you money** even a small crop of vegetables will reward you with money saved that would otherwise be spent at the shops.
- **3 Sunlight keeps you healthy -** a couple of hours of summer sunshine will help you **build up your levels of vitamin D**, which is important to your health. Gardening outside in sunlight helps to ward off many illnesses and raises your levels of serotonin, the vitamin in your body that makes you happier and healthier.
- 4 Burning up the calories doing just 30 minutes of gardening on your allotment, burns around 150 calories, which is just as good a low-intensity workout at the gym or doing low impact aerobics. Those who work allotments are healthier because of the exercise and much needed 'fresh-air'. So, why don't you contact us today, have a look around, and add your name to the growing waiting list.

What is happening currently on our sites? All members are now preparing the ground for this springs planting of potatoes etc. and raising veg from seeds sown both in the ground and in greenhouses. We now have our water turned on and the mowers serviced and ready for action. It's a busy time of preparation.

The next meetings of the Parish Council will take place on Monday 9 May (to include the Annual Parish Council meeting) and Monday 6 June. Both will be held at the village hall, in the lounge area. NDP Report for the Review April 2022

The review of the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) has been progressing well during the last few months. A report has been presented to Hatfield Peverel Parish Council (HPPC) at each monthly meeting but the NDP group felt an update should now be provided to you.

The NDP group consider it appropriate to extend the plan period by five years, so its new expiry date will become 2038.

Aecom, planning consultants, were instructed via Locality funding, to carry out a Housing Needs Assessment for HPPC. This was completed in November 2021, and which identifies in technical terms that the Parish may have little or no outstanding housing requirement over the new Plan period based on the number of already permitted dwellings and those under construction. The document is very detailed, and will be available on the Parish Council website in due course.

The NDP group had previously discussed a site allocation for development in the new Plan but in view of the Parish having met its housing needs, the group agreed there is no need to put out a 'call for sites' for a site allocation as part of this review.

Aecom, were also instructed to draft a Design Code for the Parish, again via Locality funding. The consultants visited the Parish last October, and walked around both Hatfield Peverel and Nounsley with the NDP group. A draft was provided by Aecom which was reviewed and amended by the group, and the final version has now been issued. Again, this document is very detailed, and will be available on the Parish Council website in due course.

The other issues reported in the August 2021 edition of the Hatfield Peverel Review, are being addressed in the review of the Plan document itself carried out by planning consultants, DAC Planning. These include the boundary review, green wedge, heritage, housing and air quality policies. At the time of writing the final draft is anticipated any day.

Consultation on the updated NDP will be carried out by Braintree District Council (BDC) as previously, and residents and statutory consultees can comment on the documents in the usual way.

The reviewed Neighbourhood Development Plan alongside Braintree District Council's emerging Local Plan will ensure planning for the Parish is up to date, and will provide direction for developers, BDC and the Parish Council when determining all planning applications.

News from St Andrews and All Saints

Easter is late this year and the Review will contain Holy week and Easter Services. I was struck by what one of our political commentators said about the war in Ukraine. He suggested that the result of this war, whichever way it goes, will mean that we will be living in a new age. He went on to say that for the last 30 years, referencing defence cutbacks, the western world has been living in



ignorance. Interestingly, this is exactly what the New Testament says about life before Jesus and life after. As Christians, Easter marks the beginning of a new age, or as the late Pope John-Paul II once said, this marks the beginning of the 'people of the resurrection'.

Between Easter and Pentecost we enter the great 50 days. Gospel readings for this period concentrate on the resurrection appearances of Jesus in John's Gospel, along with passages that almost predict what is going to happen to Jesus that relate directly to his resurrection, as well as accounts from the Acts of the Apostles as to how the early Church worked through this amazing happening, both intellectually and practically.

Over the last two months, we have continued with monthly Coffee Mornings as well as 'Soup and Roll' fundraiser which raised £450 for the displaced people of the Ukraine. Mothering Sunday (not Mother's Day) was celebrated in both churches, with bunches of flowers and a simnel cake; both of which were prepared the day before.

We now look forward to Holy Week and Easter, services are detailed below.

Carole's sermon was very timely as straight after the Parish Eucharist there was a Baptism Service for Cindy Hull.

All Saints has a busy time coming up as Easter approaches and there will be Services for Palm Sunday, Good Friday and, of course, Easter Sunday which is always a well-attended morning at the Church. Information about these Services appears at the end of this article.

In June Bishop Roger will come to All Saints to conduct a Service of Confirmation when five members of the congregation will be confirmed. Further details will be given in the next issue of the Review and everyone is welcome to attend the Service.

Now Covid restrictions have been eased, I am pleased to announce that there is to be an Open Day at All Saints Church on Sunday 24 April and again on Friday 29 April from 2pm to 5pm, in conjunction with the National Garden Scheme's Open Gardens at Ulting Wick. These impressive eleven acres of gardens have been featured in many articles and magazines and have also appeared on BBC's Gardener's World. In 2021 there was a very special accolade when they won the Eastern Region of 'The Nation's Favourite Garden' National Garden Scheme competition, as voted by readers of English Garden. As Trustees of the Church under Charity law, however, we were required to obtain the best price for the asset.

We hope villagers will be delighted to know that the building has been purchased by another Christian organisation, the Fairfax Gospel Hall Trust based in Woodham Mortimer and that they intimated in their tender bid that they wish to retain the appearance of the current building. We were very pleased to have this conclusion to the process.

Many of you know that we had not been meeting in the old building for the past 3 years and are happily established at the Little Bears Nursery building in Maldon Road. Our services are cafe style, starting with refreshments from 9am with worship beginning around 9.15am. We have a relaxed family friendly all age worship, using live music and media, reflecting on the hopes and concerns of us all.

Without the worry of the upkeep of the old building we will now be able to concentrate on our community work in the village. Currently this includes the Monday Lunch Club at St Andrews School and our Stitch to Enrich craft group at The Duke of Wellington on the 1st and 3rd Thursday afternoons

Historic paths - 16 February 2022

The UK government in mid-February announced that the 2026 deadline to register historic paths is to be abolished in England.

The DEFRA statement said: We will repeal the 2026 cut-off date for recording historic rights of way, as set out in the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000, to allow time for paths to be identified and added to the public rights of way network.

Great news for walkers, which follows years of campaigning by the Ramblers, will help ensure more people can connect with nature for generations to come. It gives us more time save the most important and useful paths, ensuring they're added back to the map and protected for the future.

The Keep Yourself deadline of January 2026 meant that paths not applied for by that date would no longer be able to be added to maps based on historical evidence and risked being lost forever.

Riojas, Retrospectives and Rosés!

In February, members enjoyed a tasting of Rioja wines, 3 whites and 3 reds of varying qualities from the basic Generico up to a Gran Reserva red. We also learnt about the allowable grapes in Rioja, the 3 different Rioja regions and the unique classification method. Our favourite white was the Bodegas Navajas Crianza 2017 from the Wine Society at £8.75, favourite red an excellent-value Baron Amarillo Gran Reserva from Aldi at £8.49. Our conclusion from the tasting was the best wines were not necessarily the dearest, but general feeling was that a lot more research needed carrying out on the topic: we rely on members to continue sampling as many Riojas as possible and to share their findings with the rest of the Club!

March's meeting was a wander down Lockdown Memory Lane, as we revisited some of the top-scoring wines from our Zoom meetings between April 2020 and July 2021. Steve Spearman hosted the evening, recreating the authentic atmosphere of our Zoom sessions, complete with lack of sound or too much sound in the form of rustling crisp packets and inability to locate the mute button! Sidney House & The Laurels Surgery

With the lifting of the pandemic restrictions, the surgery has been very pleased to open the doors to patients again. There has been another spike in Covid infections recently which has had a significant impact on staffing levels. Please may we ask that all patients and visitors to the surgery continue to wear a face covering and practice good hand hygiene.

One of the biggest complaints we receive is that there are not enough appointments. The knowledgeable reception team always try to book patients in with the most appropriate healthcare professional (which isn't necessarily a GP!) to ensure you are seen by the right person, at the right time.

If we have no appointments left, we can book patients appointments with the EXTENDED ACCESS service: pre-bookable appointments, available at sites called "extended access hubs" across mid Essex and could be with a GP, Nurse Practitioner, Practice Nurse, Health Care Assistant or Pharmacist. These appointments can be during the day, evenings, weekends and on bank holidays. The closest hubs to our surgery are North Chelmsford Health Care Centre (by Sainsbury's) and Blackwater Medical Centre in Maldon.

We continue to do our best to deliver essential services to our patients, despite some vacancies in the team at present. Sadly, our reception team have been experiencing increasing amounts of unreasonable behaviour from some patients in person, on the telephone and even on social media. We ask that you all treat our hard-working staff with politeness and respect.
