Left, right - right, left

Following my appeal in the June edition I have a volunteer. I haven't yet been able to follow up our initial contact for a briefing on what the position entails but expect to do so soon, certainly before the next edition of the Review.

It Ain't Half Hot Mum...

'I'm glad it's finally hot enough to complain about how hot it is.'

As stated in May, careful planning is the key to your success in both allotments and our own gardens - who knew we would be enjoying the sun, enduring the heat, and embracing cooler days all within our recent heat wave. It is just not possible to anticipate and plan for extremes.

Having stated the obvious, we can only manage reactions and responses to what comes our way. And first and foremost, in all our minds, is how do we keep any of our garden or allotment plants alive in this heat. One answer of course is watering. But the best answer is correct, proper, and effective watering. Let's first consider what NOT to do followed by the best way to water.

- At the allotments, we see people throwing buckets of water all over. It's ineffective, and wastes most of what's thrown about. And opposite to this, haphazardly giving any plants a bit of a spray of water only stresses them. It is like giving a thirsty person a sip which is more like torture.
- Many water in the heat of the day scorching leaves and evaporating water quickly, wasting the H₂O resource.
- · Instead...
- Water very early in the day or later in the evening so your plants can effectively drink and absorb it. Cooled soil means less water evaporates.
- **Keep leaves dry**. Saturate the plant near the base to get as much as you can where really needed, roots absorb water, not leaves. Keep soil evenly moist most plants depend on even moisture and slight drying out before watering promotes root growth. But avoid water logging causing root cells to drown without oxygen. Avoid drowning them.
- Monitor your own situation but watering every second day will often be appropriate. Water seldom but thoroughly 2 to 3 times per week is usually sufficient. Better to water seldom but with plenty of water rather than a little bit daily.
- Give the right quantity of water top 2 inches of soil should be damp. Water needs a moment to seep into the soil. Better to water and repeat to avoid water flowing away unused.
- Ignore your lawns in these hot, dry days. While counterintuitive, they will recover very quickly with rain. And just spraying lightly will do more harm than good by weakening their roots. Also, mow less closely, (leave it longer) and less frequently. (Editorial note 5 August it's likely Anglian Water may soon institute a hosepipe ban.)
- Irrigate to save water water as much as necessary and as little as possible

And an invite; on 13 August we're having our Allotments Open Day at the Old Site allotments. They are located off Church Road between the corner entrance to the church and on the pathway that leads toward Ulting Road and the Cross Keys. Please feel free to join us for teas, coffees, cake, and the world's fastest disappearing sausage rolls.

Allotments are a valued asset to any community. With collateral benefits of fresh air, exercise and satisfaction of having grown it yourself increases this value. Crops of potatoes, beans, brassicas, onions, leeks, sweetcorn, salad fixings - strawberries and raspberries, may be sufficient to supplement the family diet all year round.

Finally, hydrate. Let's all remember to leave water out for pets, birds, and all the critters in our gardens. Thank you from all of them, and enjoy some yourself!

How buildings change over time



Year 2 class at Hatfield Peverel Infant School on 13 July 2022 enjoyed a visit from representatives of the Parish Council's History Group. The group told the children about the discoveries they made whilst researching the Local Heritage List Project. Hopefully it has roused the children's curiosity for the history of everyday life on their doorstep.

The children explored a PowerPoint presentation with photographs of Hatfield Peverel in the early 1900s, comparing them with images of how it looks today. The children answered questions about Ordnance Survey maps dating to 1881, 1924 and 1955. The young historians made super observations about the way the village has changed over the decades.

The 'Beyond The Bricks' exhibition stand made a special appearance on the day. The Trinity Memorial Gateway told the story of evacuees from WW2; the pupils learned the Red Telephone Kiosk was designed by Giles Gilbert Scott in 1936; and everyone agreed that the coming of





the Railway Station in Victorian times transformed village life.

The children then took part in a range of specially prepared practical activities ranging from archaeology to object handling, led by their teaching staff.

The Parish Council wishes to thank Ms McGaughey and her colleagues for such a warm welcome. A special mention to all the children who engaged brilliantly with the presentation, exhibition and activities. Well done Hatfield Peverel Infant School!

But what about short mats? Members can now play up to four days a week and once month they meet up for a friendly with other clubs. Give it a try.


We are a friendly club, a year's membership is only £50 and if you would like to visit there is someone there on Tuesdays from 2pm. Give them a look and your questions will be answered.

surviving. St Andrews church was probably the coolest place to be, nothing like good, solid stone to keep a building cool, but even St Andrews is beginning to warm up.

Both St Andrews and All Saints marked our Queen's Platinum Jubilee, our services using elements from a large body of suggestions the Palace sent out, in association mainly with the great and good of the Church of England. At St Andrews, we planted a Jubilee tree in the churchyard after the morning service, which had to be kept watered throughout the dry period, and it has definitely grown. My cat Jasper 'consecrated' it by attempting to climb up it! It is a variety of the Sequoia genus; a relative of the Canadian Redwood, an example of which is the tallest tree in the world.

By watering both the Jubilee tree and one or two other graves I have noticed how many people pass through our churchyard every day. During lockdown, especially the summer of 2020, the churchyard was one of the busiest spots in Hatfield Peverel. I met people from our village of course, but also families from other places; Chelmsford, Maldon to name but a few. Our churchyard is very much a community resource; our schools use it for teaching purposes, and many come to enjoy the tranquillity of the place and have said how much they appreciate it. But to keep it in good condition requires a lot of work. Although we have a dedicated team who meet on Friday afternoons and do wonderful things with mowers and strimmers, we are losing one of our most dedicated volunteers and the rest are not getting any younger. We need new blood if we are to maintain the churchyard in good condition. As I said in the last Review, we have the equipment, we have a refreshment break and I like to think good company. We have just said goodbye to Sandie Hulbert who is moving out of this area. She has been our Schools and Family worker for the past three years and got to know many village children with her work with our Minister at the Monday lunch club, run at St Andrew's Junior School, and other activities around the village. During covid restrictions she put sessions on YouTube so the schoolchildren still had an activity to follow and words of encouragement during worrying times. Her sessions at the school were always fun and thoughtful. She introduced the children to many craft activities which helped them to understand a little about a Christian faith and how to respond to and value their family, friends and school and also give them the inner strength to be the best person that they wished to be. We will miss her but wish her well in her new house and for her new career.

We have obtained funding to replace her role and are now actively seeking a replacement – we would love to hear from anyone local interested in the position.

Welcomes have been extended to 2 Ukrainian families that have been given accommodation in the village and we thank those host families who are helping in this way. Our visitors are making themselves at home in our church and we admire their progress in learning a new language and finding work.

Our Sunday services have become more flexible to manage these language barriers and find a common point of reference. **We have used Drama to enhance our worship; having a play about Elijah (featuring one of our guests). This has become particularly relevant in our current weather predicament where God tells Elijah there will be no rain in the next few years!

Jeff spoke recently on the differences between holy and happy, whether both could occur simultaneously. He showed us pictures of singing, homes, families, chocolate, Church, the Bible and prayer and invited us to put them under the heading of holy or happy. Try it yourselves! Discussion occurred where pictures could be both.

People may think a holy person would be dour, restricted, follow rules and not have fun. Our founder of the Methodist Church, John Wesley, in 1874 did not make any rules but asked the people a set of 22 questions - were they honest, trusted, not proud, or a grumbler and was Christ real to them. He felt we did not need rules to bring us closer to God and give us a framework to make life easier and happier. Jesus wants us all to have a relationship with God which will enable us to have a holy and happy life in all its fullness.

Our children used Lego (which is a universal toy) to build places where they were happy – we had zoos, homes, beaches and playgrounds.


