

### **Baker Avenue footpath**

Ken Earney, Parish Paths Partnership (P3) rep for Hatfield Peverel

Pollowing our article in the last issue, we have been getting evidence of use questionnaires round to people we considered most likely to be frequent users of the path, those in the Baker Avenue and roads in the immediate vicinity, and also to those who have contacted us as a result of the article. We have distributed somewhere in the region of 80 or 90 forms, and have had 35 returned so far. We would still like to hear from anyone who has not yet been contacted who has made frequent use of this path within the last twenty years, but also anyone with experience of using it earlier, since it was created in the late 50s.

For those who have yet to complete the form, a plea. Please consider questions 1 and 19 carefully before answering, then give as good an estimate as you can as to how often and when you have used it. These are probably the most important questions in the form which will give the assessors the background to how important this path is to all of us. They are looking for how many people have used it over the more than the twenty years principally taken into account - when, how often, and the whole variety of different purposes, ie work, school, scouts and guides, cricket, allotments, village shops and services etc. In Q19 it is proving difficult for most people to say how many, and how often, they have seen others on the path over all the years that they have used, but have a go and try to give a feeling for it. For instance, you might say something along the lines of 'impossible to be certain, I was usually alone and saw maybe one or two individuals most days that I used it'. (You will already have given an estimate of how many times per week, month or year in Q1.) The fuller an impression you give of path use the better - but please don't exaggerate!


By the way, I've noticed that a number of respondents have both walked and cycled on the path. If we are successful in getting ECC to adopt the path then it will no longer be legal to cycle on it.

### **Expansion of food waste collection**

Richard Bisset, Interim Manager, Operations, Braintree District Council

lanned expansion of our food waste collection service will take place from Monday, 24th September. Collection day for Hatfield Peverel will be a Monday. The expansion funded by Essex County Council will complete the roll-out of this service to all accessible households in Braintree District. Key benefits will include consistency of service provision across the District, weekly collections of food waste for a majority of residents, improved customer satisfaction, reduced processing costs, increased recycling and higher diversion of waste from land fill to a more sustainable option.

Food waste vehicle routes will match green waste routes as far as possible to ensure the green waste vehicle on that route collects just pure green waste. Contamination of green waste will result in the entire load requiring the more expensive 'in vessel' composting treatment - it is important that residents do not put food waste into their green bin once the food waste collections commence.

### Process for extending the scheme

Households new to the scheme will receive an introductory letter and leaflet in July, followed by delivery of a small food waste container and instruction pack in August and September. **Collections** of the new food waste container will commence from **Monday 24 September 2012.** Collection dates will be provided.

#### How the scheme works

Householders will be required to separate all their food waste (including fish, meat and bones; cooked and uncooked food) and put it in their food waste container. This will be collected on a weekly basis on the same day (as far as possible) as the refuse and recycling and sent for 'in-vessel' composting. The grey and green bins will remain on alternating weekly collections.

**Food waste** can be put straight into the new food bin or wrapped in newspaper or in compostable caddy liners. Information about which caddy liners are suitable will be included in the instruction pack delivered with the containers. Information will also be available on the Council's website.

Once the new weekly food waste collection service has been introduced, it is essential that residents do not put any food waste into their green or grey wheeled bins.

We are able to offer a limited number of food waste surgeries, drop-in sessions or parish briefings prior to the start of the service. ### **Letter spot**

In recent months and more particularly in recent weeks the post has been arriving at odd times, on one occasion at 6.30pm. Having made enquiries



it would seem that parts of the village are without a designated postman. Until 6 months ago the village had four postman but due to ill health Les the postman who delivered to my road has left the service and remains very poorly.

It appears that the powers that be have instructed the three remaining postman to sort it out between themselves for a trial period of 38 weeks; we are now about 25 weeks in and the postal service is becoming poorer by the day. The remaining postman are supposed to tag us at the end of the day after they have finished their own rounds. An example is a birthday card with a 1st class stamp posted in Birmingham on 5 July arrived mid afternoon on 11 July. Other mail which senders have assured us has been posted remains undelivered or arrives days later than we would have expected. It seems to me we are receiving a sub standard service compared to the rest of the village.

This morning I contacted the Royal Mail to put in a complaint which will be sent to a local manager.

The affected roads are: The Street, The Pines and all the roads leading off, The Pines, Strutt Close, Mortimer Road, and Arthy Close

The very helpful lady in the complaints department has issued a complaint number in case any other residents/businesses wish to complain in which case the complaint will then be handed to an area manager. 

### Support for the homeless

Mother's Union

15th May - We had an interesting talk by Helen Poulter from the Chelmsford branch of CHESS - the Churches Homeless Emergency Support Scheme. The charity has been in existence for 25 years and the Chelmsford branch active since 1994, starting as a soup run to the street homeless and now providing emergency shelters and multiple-occupancy houses. CHESS aims to (1) provide temporary accommodation for homeless adults; (2) meet their basic needs for sustenance and hygiene; (3) implement a plan for a more settled way of life and a sense of self worth and security, and (4) recognise the dignity and cultural individuality of those who use the

facilities offered. In Chelmsford the main shelter has eight beds in seven bedrooms with a further seventeen beds in four other properties in the City. Residents were originally allocated a room for about a month but in today's economic climate this sometimes has to be extended to six months, as finding employment and helping them plan their way to independent living is much harder.

The shelter provides a cooked meal every morning before it closes for the day, and another when it opens for the night. During their stay residents are helped with various legal requirements by support workers - obtaining birth certificates, housing advice, benefits, CVs, applying for jobs, etc. They are expected to pay

approx. £3.50 per day from their benefit to help with accommodation costs, to keep their rooms clean and tidy and to keep appointments with health officials. Alcohol and drugs are strictly banned, and they are expected to take part in any learning or training activities which are agreed as being appropriate. There are Monday morning prayer meetings to emphasise the Christian ethos of CHESS, and a weekly job club to help

people into work and maybe a new home. It is a sobering thought to realise that homelessness is no respecter of people or profession and, in these days of economic hardship, it is affecting more and more of us, and CHESS exists alongside the local Authorities to offer help and support to anyone in trouble.

We were very grateful for Helen's talk which opened our eyes and gave us much to think about.

### **Methodist Church**

his report is written in the midst of celebrations for the Olympic torch arrival in this village. At 7.30am on Friday 6th July, Maldon Road showed no signs of the imminent arrival of this event but within the hour paths were filled with people of all ages from babies in prams to elderly in wheelchairs. Everyone was exited to see the torch being carried through our own roads as it continued its journey through Great Britain. Despite the rain everyone enjoyed the occasion. Well done to the village organising committee, which included two of our church members, who organised a day's activity in the village hall and the recreation ground.

Our Olympic theme continued with the service on the following Sunday when our preacher for the day, Esther Hume, spoke about the work of Action for Children, the Methodist based charity which supports and speaks out for the UK's most vulnerable and neglected children and young people, on their life's journey. She spoke emotionally of her own granddaughter, Chloe Bond, who had been nominated to carry the Olympic torch in recognition of her work with young people. Chloe had been interviewed for TV and said the torch she was carrying was the light of God which was shining around the world. Chloe has just finished her degree in Social care and will now begin working professionally in that area. We wish her success. We sang: -

We are pilgrims on a journey and companions on the road: we are here to help each other walk the mile and bear the load. We extend a warm welcome to our Church to everyone who is seeking to find God's presence in their life.
