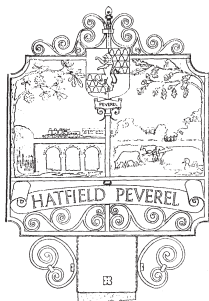

Technology has changed everything: the handwritten, sometimes typed copy took three to four weeks from preparation to getting the magazine through your letter box. At one of our two-monthly meetings there were loud explosions from the kitchen - the elderflower champagne had had enough and damaged a pile of copies!

In the mid '90s during unemployment Ken came on board with the bonus of a European Computer Driving Licence with a desktop publishing module. We entered the digital age with our first computer, sending our finished editions to first Beeleigh Litho and then Kempco initially in its native DTP format and now as a PDF. This has speeded up the production rate enormously. (Ken is the miracle worker as far as the photographs are concerned and fixing all my techie hangups). The miracle today is that our wonderful printers Kempco can return an edition in two/three days.

Things change. Many now get their news by phones, tablets, laptops and desktop computers. The Parish Council is currently considering how to continue delivering news of current local interest, no doubt not as we have done up 'til now.

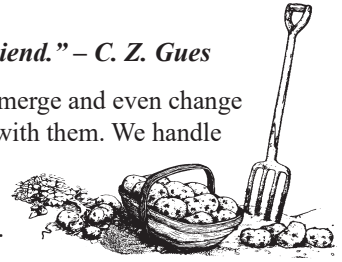

## Allotment and Growing News – August 2023

Some parts of the world have four seasons. Recently, our seasons seem to merge and even change places! But on the allotment, we accept their realities and all that comes with them. We handle weather even with all its extremities. We prepare, wait and as soon as there are signs of suitable weather, we go for it. We have learned to survive allotmenting by developing the ability to improvise, adapt, and overcome. Whether it's changing clothing, or the day and times we visit, we always improvise, adapt, and overcome. And in Hatfield Peverel, we've been doing this for the past 55 years.



Yes, you read that correctly. And on 12 August, our HPAA Open Day will celebrate our 55th Anniversary. We will meet on the Cart Lodge Site (old site) to reminisce, and share stories etched in our memory. We even have a few pictures of the old days. If you have photos, please bring them along.

### **Here are some weather-related tips:**

- 1 In hot, dry weather, water plants every other day.
- 2 Keep on top of weeds competing with crops for nutrients and water.
- 3 Keep container plants well-watered and feed them with a liquid fertiliser fortnightly.
- 4 Feed sweetcorn plants with tomato food to get the best cobs.
- 5 Sweetcorn - ready to harvest when the juices are milky.
- 6 Look out for potato and tomato blight - remove and destroy any affected plants to prevent its spread.
- 7 Don't waste water on lawns – it will soon green up in the rain.
- 8 Raise the cutting height of your lawn mower in late summer.
- 9 Take lots of photos if you want to rearrange things over the winter — it's much easier to do this if you have a reference point.

On behalf of the HPAA, we wish you and yours a continued safe, healthy, and enjoyable summer!

## Learn to love wasps

### A wasp-free world would be significantly worse



Some years ago in the summer wasps built a large nest under the eaves outside our lounge and worrying about stings we had it removed. Reading Alys Fowler's article on wasps in our paper has made me think.

Where there was once a solitary queen, there are many insects building and foraging and the nest grows in size. The colony will survive until early autumn until the first queen dies - without her no-one goes to work foraging and everyone gets hungry. Cannibalism, workers ripping up the nest. Everyone left behind freezes. The whole nest will be empty by winter and it won't be revisited next year.

While things run smoothly the growing colony needs food and lots of it, workers are collecting protein to fatten larvae, caterpillars, spiders and soft-bodied insects. Wasps are excellent garden predators and will be doing all sorts of good work. The adults love sugar which will attract attention but some believe if you talk to wasps with good intention they do listen. If one comes by you, you must firmly but politely say 'please leave' without raising your voice or flapping about. Good luck!

We are hoping to build some compost heaps in that area which will provide a refuge and feeding area for creatures such as hedgehogs, beetles, toads, bats, birds, grass snakes, small mammals and slow-worms.

Thank you to the Parish Council who recently approved an Environmental Policy which sets objectives to improve environmental efficiency and protect/enhance the local environment and biodiversity. # News from St Andrews and All Saints

In terms of the Church's Year, we are well into the Sundays after Trinity. We are actually following St Matthew's Gospel (unceremoniously called Year A) and the colours of the altar frontal and other items such as the lectern fall (the bit of material that hangs from lectern) is green. Green is, of course, associated with growth and this reminds us that this is the time, now that the big festivals of Christmas, Holy Week, Easter, Ascension and Whitsun, to step back for a moment and look at the Gospels more closely. This period of growth is the Church following Jesus' example. He always took time out from the big events and the large and demanding crowds to recharge his spiritual batteries so that he did not lose sight of the bigger picture; what his Father wanted him to do and where he wanted him to go.



As I was sorting out my collection of Reviews I came across August 2011 - it had my favourite cover, the steam engine 'Britannia' steaming through Hatfield Peverel. It was a mucky day but no less exciting for that. The BR standard 'Pacific' (4-6-2) was a pioneer in East Anglian traction before electrification, reducing the time between Liverpool Street and Norwich to two hours with two stops - Colchester and Ipswich.

St Andrews has seen a number of concerts this year with more to follow. Back in June, the Anglia Singers gave us a selection of light choral music, including a rendition of Ar Hyd y Nos (All Through the Night) in Welsh. This was most appropriate as the late Cyril Jones was a long-standing member of the Anglia Singers (as well as being a Reader and in our choir) and was a fluid Welsh speaker. As it happened, quite by coincidence, a memorial seat was erected in the churchyard two days before the concert.

We then had a concert by the Hadfelda Choir 'Songs for a Summer Evening', folk songs, musicals and what were once called 'pop' songs. This was deliberately billed as a fun concert; simply reflecting what we sing when we meet on a Thursday afternoon. As is their custom, they supported a charity by donations from the audience and, along with £200 received before the concert, £550 was raised on the night. This year's chosen charity was 'Music for Dementia'. We have another two concerts in St Andrews this year: a trio led by Emma Nash, a concert pianist and accompanist on Saturday 7 October and Witham Choral are returning to perform Haydn's St Nicholas Mass on Saturday 2 December with carols for the audience.

On Sunday 17 September there will be a special combined service at St Andrews. Posters will distributed later next month, but it will be the only service that morning at 11.00am. Light refreshments will be available after the service in the Church Hall. We hope to have part of this outside, weather permitting.

## **Hatfield Peveler Methodist and Reality Church**

**We continue to endeavour to match our Christian faith with circumstances that we meet in our lives, or hear and read about.**

Our recent service linked the sad news that the submarine that took five people down to see the Titanic remains had disintegrated, contrasting with the on-going news that people were dying in dinghies trying to cross the Mediterranean Sea and the English Channel. In the first instance the occupants had spent \$250000 each to view the site of the Titanic as an exciting adventure compared with immigrants using life savings or taking out loans to pay for dangerous passages to escape war, famine, poverty, and danger. Both situations have led to loss of lives and great sadness for the families left behind.

We were asked in the service whether we were doing enough individually and as a country to support people who are fleeing dreadful situations – by coincidence we had a new family from Ukraine attending who had escaped from the Dnipro River area in Southern Ukraine where the dam had been blown up and large areas had been flooded. The mother told us that there was no running water, that bottled water was totally inadequate and that rockets flew overhead every day.

Our bible tells us in Matthew 10 v 40-42 that ‘if anyone gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones who is my disciple, truly I tell you, that person will certainly not lose their reward’. Jesus is telling his disciples how rewarding giving can be.

### **Lunch Club at St Andrew’s Junior School**

After a very enjoyable term exploring Bible stories with the children and learning how God cares for each one of us, we celebrated the happy times we have had together, with a party for each group on the last Monday. As is normal, all the children were keen to win the party games and receive a mini bar of chocolate but we saw the thoughtfulness towards each other with the winners immediately and voluntarily sharing their prize with others who had not been so lucky, producing smiles all round.

## Mutability\*

Percy Bysshe Shelley

*We are as clouds that veil the midnight moon;  
How restlessly they speed, and gleam, and quiver,  
Streaking the darkness radiantly - yet soon  
Night closes round, and they are lost for ever:*

*Or like forgotten lyres, whose dissonant strings  
Give various response to each varying blast,  
To whose frail frame no second motion brings  
One mood or modulation like the last.*

*We rest...A dream has power to poison sleep;  
We rise. - One wandering thought pollutes the day;  
We feel, conceive or reason, laugh or weep;  
Embrace fond woe, or cast our cares away:*

*It is the same! - For, be it joy or sorrow'*

*The path of its departure still is free:*

*Man's yesterday may ne'er be like his morrow;  
Nought may endure but Mutability.*

Percy Bysshe Shelley, sailing north along the Italian coast to Lerici from Livorno, where he had met up with his friend Lord Byron, drowned when his rickety boat capsized. When his remains washed up ten days later, the book of John Keats poetry was found in his pocket. He was 28.

His friend Keats lived just 25 years, Byron 36; their poems lost. *Mutability* was a favourite of his wife's. In Frankenstein she put lines from the poem into the mouths of both Victor and the creature he fashioned from the bodies of the dead. Shelley's own corpse had an afterlife. Buried in quicklime in a shallow grave, owing to Italy's strict quarantine laws, then dug up later and cremated on a pyre.
