Official start of Winter? 22 December!

Allotment and growing news, Chairman Drew Price HPAA new site letting officer, www.hpaa.org.uk

Winter officially starts on 22 December in the UK. But rain, cloud, low temperatures, and wind are making folks feel it is already here. British allotment holders enjoy the onset of winter. They, like the rest of us, love the seasonal change, cosy evenings in front of the wood burner, the chance to put feet up and forget allotment or garden for a while. Many allotments are done for the season, others are in final tidy up mode. It was overall a successful year despite weather challenges. Too wet, too dry, too hot, too cold or too windy.

Highlights include a successful quiz night in June, changing our July competition day to a recognition day, and a good turnout for our AGM in November. Seeds, potatoes and chicken manure pellets are on order.

There are several things we do on the allotments at this time of year for a solid start next season. Some ideas may be helpful for your home gardens as well.

- 1 Clear up rotting and finished plants: Composting now will provide future organic matter. Wait for a dry day to weed properly, rake fallen leaves and remove the remains of summer crops. Leaving them to rot will only invite disease or pests.
- 2 Manure early. We do this to maximise the time that manure has to work on the soil. Leaving manure on the surface of the beds protects the precious soil below from the harsh weather.
- 3 Plant fruit: Now is a good time to plant bare-root fruit bushes such as gooseberries and blackberries, but they can be planted at any point during the dormant season of November to the end of March.
- 4 Divide/plant bulbs: daffodils, tulips, crocuses are ready to go back into the soil for next year's display.
- 5 Check your equipment: Now is the perfect time to give everything a once-over. Do tools need fixing or replacing? Is the wheelbarrow wheel wobbly? Do metal or wooden items need oiling? Are the mouse traps working? Are the shed door locks and window latches secure and reliable?
- 6 Know when and how to harvest: pluck Brussels sprouts from bottom up and pick parsnips only after the first frosts because the cold temperature gives them their sweet flavour by turning starches into sugars.

Wishing you a cosy winter, special Christmas and the warm clear vision of your spring garden.

Hatfield Peverel Library

Essex County Council has published its 'Essex Future Library Services Strategy 2019-2024'. It states: "The council has listened to the feedback received from the consultation - it is very clear that libraries are valued by those who use them not just for books but also as safe social spaces and hubs for a range of activities. In many locations there is community support for retaining some form of library service. While the provision of council-run library services must be driven by evidence of need for them, our intention is that by working with communities, we can together keep a library service in every current location."

The Parish Council has discussed involvement in a community led library service, but at this time does not have resources available to commit to the project. I am very proud and excited to take on the role of Headteacher in a school that I love working in. Our staff are hugely committed to making the biggest impact on the lives of our children and the families of Hatfield Peverel and beyond.

Our new vision statement 'Let Your Light Shine' based on the verse from the Bible Matthew 5:16 is key to the curriculum planning and opportunities that our children are given. We plan for and ensure that children have a wide range of opportunities in order to develop the 'whole' child and are passionate about ensuring that our children are able to 'shine'. Our 'Shine' Celebrations are opportunities for the whole school to celebrate and for children to be identified as shining in their own way. Albeit for trying particularly hard in school, being an amazing mathematician, a talented sportsman or artist, or through always making the right choices in school and being a kind member of the school community.

I have a firm belief that children learn best when they are happy and secure in their learning environment, with clear boundaries and expectations. In order to make the childrens' learning experiences as valuable as they can be, we try to immerse the children in whichever topic they are focused on that term. Engaging trips and cross-curricular days are key to developing interest and 'linking the children's learning' in school. Duxford, Colchester Castle, The Royal Observatory in Greenwich and Danbury Park are a few trips that children have enjoyed this term; this has been reflected in some excellent work.

We have developed Forest Schools this term in our 'Outdoor Classroom' – the opportunities for teamwork, communication, negotiation, problem solving and creativity have been very well-received and the Year 6 children have really impressed me with their enthusiasm and enjoyment.

We are always keen to work better with members of the wider community, so if you have any spare time and would like to come and support our children by hearing them read or sharing a skill you have please pop in to the school office to request a Volunteer application pack. We DBS check all volunteers and will be requesting references, but if you would like to help we'd love to hear from you.

As we look forward to Christmas with everything that it brings we will be thinking of those less fortunate than ourselves. This year we are supporting the local Home Start group by making 'Christmas Craft Packs' that are distributed to families in need this Christmas.

So there is a good argument for thinking about the coming of Christ earlier than Advent. Possibly the secular world might have a point, though I still find it slightly off-putting to see Christmas-orientated products even before Halloween?

As I indicated last year, both in Hatfield Peverel and Ulting we held our Remembrance Sunday services at the correct time in order that we join in the Act of Remembrance alongside the rest of the UK.

Celebrations at All Saints Church Ulting

Another group consisted of prospective foster carers together with their prospective foster children and Elaine said how coming together at Cardfields had given them all the opportunity to get to know each other in a location where support could be given by the staff, and Elaine paid tribute to all those who work there. Cardfields has events when they welcome visitors to the Centre and it is well worth a visit. The Remembrance Service at All Saints was an opportunity to reflect on those who had given their lives in both World Wars and subsequent conflicts. The silhouette of a lone soldier had been standing at All Saints for the past two weeks and was a poignant symbol for everyone who had visited the Church or had passed by on the river or walked

along the opposite bank. The Remembrance Service itself was a reflective one with

appropriate hymns, prayers and two poems written by Rupert Brook and John Gillespie Magee. The congregation then walked to the War Memorial where the names of those who returned safely from the two World Wars were read out and thanks were given for their return. These were followed by the names of those who had died, together with a short account of who they were and where they lived, vividly bringing to life the names on the Memorial. At eleven o'clock two minutes' silence took place when all that could be heard was the rustling of the trees. A wreath of poppies was laid and everyone returned to the Church for a welcome cup of hot soup served with sausage rolls and cakes.

In October our speaker Diane Hutchinson, a part- time volunteer Ward Chaplain at Broomfield Hospital, gave us an insight into her duties there. The Chaplaincy is 22 years old with three full time and four part-time Ministry Chaplains plus 15 - 20 volunteers on a weekday, the ward chaplains. Sundays are covered by the Ministry Chaplains. Between them they cover the whole hospital 24/7. Training includes shadowing a professional before being allowed on a ward alone. There are rules when dealing with patients, confidentiality is essential. Conversation must be instigated by them, and listened to without interruption. If a patient confides worries and becomes upset, with permission you may hold their hands or give them a hug, human touch is very important. Diane works one day a week and has mixed feelings as she approaches her ward. She hopes for fresh patients but enjoys meeting long term ones who have become special friends...

A guided tour round our church

For our November meeting we enjoyed another interesting talk by our Churchwarden John Strange. When he came last year he told us the story of Ingelrica and how our church was founded in the 12th. century. This time, he took us on a tour of the building to point out items of historical interest.



The bells. There was once a bell tower on the north-west corner which fell down in the 1700s. It housed the two bells we still have: the tolling bell, dated 1715, is in the bell turret at the east end of the church behind the organ, the other is dated 1724 and is situated outside the turret. It strikes the hours on the church clock. (*Photo: left and centre, Tom Fletcher*)

Glass. The windows in the north aisle contain various Coats of Arms set in clear glass including, in the Royal Window, that of Elizaeth I quartered with the French Coat of Arms.

The east window depicts the Lord's Crucifixion and Ascension and is dated 1875. The west window depicts The Annuciation, the visit to Elizabeth, the song of the shepherds, the Infant Saviour, the worship of the Magi, and the presentation at the temple.

The glass was given by Mr WM Tufnell of Hatfield Place in memory of his wife Eliza Issabella who died in 1894. The design was by Mr CE Kempe who's trademark symbol was a sheaf of wheat incorporated in the design (*if you can find it*!)

The most interesting item in church is the recumbent effigy on the sill of one of the north windows. For

many years there has been controversy over whether or not it represents IIngelrica. Expert opinion is divided. However, it is known there was once a stone coffin in the floor just below the window and the effigy was part of the lid. When opened, it was found to contain an



assortment of bones, male and female. It is known that both Ingelrica and her husband Ranulph Peverel died in 1127 so is it possible the bones were theirs? We shall never know but it is an interesting theory.

These are only some of the features John showed us during the afternoon. He rolled back the carpet just below the Sanctuary to reveal the family brasses there. It's astonishing to realise how many thousands of feet have walked over them during the years. We also discovered the church was originally dedicated to St. Mary

but it was changed during the dissolution of the monastries in Henry V's reign to St. Andrew. (*The three three carved heads of medieaval figures on one of the bench ends in the choir stalls, are of 14th century origin.* (*Photo: John Strange*)

Thank you to John for an enthralling afternoon. (*If anyone would like a look round the church John would be pleased to take you, ring 381004*)

If you don't like spiders, read no further! But create a spider-friendly garden and you may learn to love them

Last year there was an explosion of the eight-legged creatures in Britain's gardens due to the warm weather. Here's why you should welcome them into your outdoor spaces

Where have all these huge spiders in our back gardens come from? It is a question asked a lot at the moment, given the apparent population explosion in recent weeks, and the webs lacing our outdoor spaces. But actually, they've been here since early spring, as tiny 1mm spiderlings, from eggs deposited under a silken protective igloo last autumn. At this time of year, they are reaching adult maturity – finally big enough to be noticed.

This year's warm summer has been kind to spiders, giving them plenty of invertebrate food (mostly flies, but also bees, wasps, butterflies and beetles), and a temperature that speeds up their growth.

So what should you look our for in your garden? Ubiquitous is the garden spider, Araneus diadematus, named after the diadem-like markings on its abdomen.

Britain's largest species is the Araneus quadratus, a great blob of a spider almost as big as a walnut, marked with four pale egg-shaped dots on its abdomen.

Spiders are good to have around. After birds, they are the most important predators of insects, and a cornerstone of the natural balance that usually keeps nuisance blow-flies, houseflies and greenbottles at bay. A healthy spider population is also a good indicator of a healthy insect fauna in the area.

They are also masters of engineering; each will build a web combining up to 20 metres of silk, welded at more than 1,000 joints as the sticky spiral net is laid across 30-40 radiating spokes. And although the total web weighs only half a milligram, it is capable of supporting more than 4,000 times its weight. It is a truly glorious sight. As autumn dews start to settle, with cooler weather to come, the webs become even more picturesque.

So how can you make your garden more spider-friendly? Think about the open space that spiders like to build their webs across: hedges, fence posts, bushes, tall plants or draped on a clematis thicket. And, crucially, try to leave them be. They have an annual life cycle and will start to disappear when the winter cold arrives, so enjoy them while you can.

The A12 Widening Scheme roadshow Ken Earney

The final session of Highways England's A12 Chelmsford to A120 widening scheme consultation was held in St Andrews church hall on Tuesday 19 December. It had two aims:

1 - to present four potential route options for a scheme dealing with the section between Junctions 23 (Rivenhall) and 25 (east of the outskirts of Marks Tey) and

2 - to announce the preferred route improvements for the section from Junction 19 (Boreham interchange) to Junction 23 (Rivenhall).

My impression was that there were two main areas of interest for the steady stream of residents attending. First, the detail of how the proposed scheme will affect traffic flows and congestion through the village at all times - in The Street, Maldon Road, Church Road and Station Road - but mostly of course during the Monday to Friday morning and evening rush hours, resulting from the removal of Junctions 20a at Bury Lane and 20b at the Witham end of the village. The second was how the removal of the two junctions will impact on our ability to travel to and from Chelmsford, and similarly to Witham, Kelvedon etc as easily as we do at present. Our lived experience of traffic in our village.

The Highways England team was fielding a lot of feedback and questioning about these issues during the time I was there. There seemed to be a lack of awareness in some team members of these issues and indeed of some of the locations we were talking about. We expect that the feedback they took away with them will be taken into account and will inform how this scheme is developed over the coming months.

I learned only that, apart from the mammoth disruption that the works to enlarge each carriageway from two lanes to three would cause, a new link road would connect a new enlarged Junction 21 at Latneys to the access into the village by D's Diner (the site of the removed Junction 20b). However, absolutely no detail was available at this presentation, and there appeared to be no recollection of the matter of a Maldon/ Heybridge link road from the enlarged Junction 21 having been raised in 2017. Provision of such an access road would be an Essex County Council matter however.

The developed scheme will be subject to a further public consultation in a year or so when this detail will be available. We expect that the scheme will have taken account of the comments made by visitors to this consultation: the deadline for written comments was 1 December.
