Hatfield Peverel - and the whole of our country as we know it - is changing fast. In this issue, on pages 10 and 11, we look at the options put forward for the recently announced widening of the A12 into three lanes between Boreham and Marks Tey. This will have a great impact on our village entailing a fair amount of disruption over a considerable period whilst construction is in progress, and we need to make the powers that be know how we feel about the changes. We live here and as far as traffic goes, we have a fair idea of what works and doesn't work. The Maldon Road junction with The Street doesn't. work. Have a careful look at the options proposed, then think about whether there are other options not on offer - a bypass for instance? Make sure you get your input to the consultation.

While these plans have to be discussed and formulated - work is due to start in 2020 - more urgent is the planning situation regarding housebuilding. NDP's progress report, and the proposed 140 houses on Stonepath Meadow, is likely to be discussed at the planning meeting on 28th February at Causeway House, Braintree. On page 11 are contact details for objections which we urge you to make. The application for 120 dwellings to the north east of Gleneagles Way can be seen under the Parish Clerk's report on page 6. Get your objections in to these planning applications and come and support the village at the meetings.

Public Footpath upkeep

Tt's becoming increasingly apparent that if we want to deal with footpath maintenance and upkeep issues in the future in the village we can no longer rely solely on the work carried out by the parish's handyman, ECC contractors or support from outside provided by the likes of Friends of the Flitch Way. (The parish handyman's costs are recovered annually from ECC Public Rights of Way.) We are going to have to attend to some of these things ourselves. A small working group of volunteers turning out on a reasonably regular basis as required could deal with many of the necessary tasks - path surface strimming, cutting back encroaching side vegetation, installing or re-erecting waymarker posts or other path furniture issues.

If we can convene a small group of volunteers, 4 to 6 people, I can arrange for an ECC PROW officer to visit us and outline what is possible and what equipment support ECC can provide.

Erection of rear/side extensions and construction of new pitched roof at Avon Lea, Ulting Road. Outline planning permission for up to 140 dwellings (including up to 40% affordable housing), introduction of structural planting and landscaping, informal public open space and children's play area, surface water mitigation and attenuation, site access of Stonepath Drive with associated ancillary works at land south of Stonepath Drive. Precept for coming fiscal year

Hatfield Peverel Parish Council has agreed a precept figure of £57,523 for the coming fiscal year. This is an increase of 4% from the previous year's £55,328 and equates to less than the 33% decrease in Localism Funding down by £3,540 from £10,619 last year to £7,079 this year.

Award winners will be invited to a civic reception with the Chairman of the Council in April 2017.

A12 Widening Scheme Consultation

Highways England (HE) has recently given notice of its intention to improve the A12 from junction 19 at the Boreham Interchange to junction 25 at Marks Tey.

Why improvements are needed?

The first of the A12 improvements to be implemented, starting in 2020, is the 15 mile poorly performing section between junctions 19 and 25 with very high volumes of traffic, often at over capacity, and frequently experiencing congestion at peak times, The 8 junctions present a number of problems and there are safety concerns with some of the highest collision and casualty rates. Amongst particular locations shown to be suffering limited capacity and poor performance is the section of junctions 20a to 21 through Hatfield Peverel, due to merging and diverging traffic between the A12 and local road network. It is also the busiest link on this section of the A12, with in excess of 40,000 vehicles daily in each direction.

Highways England A12 Improvement Proposals

Four options are being put forward for consultation to improve the A12 between junctions 19 - 25, (Boreham interchange to the A120 interchange at Marks Tey). Option 1 looks at widening the A12 to three lanes in each direction across the entire section whilst the other 3 options consider widening part of the A12 and building new off line sections of road at Rivenhall and/or Marks Tey.

Implications of widening improvements between Junctions 20a to 21

Evidence demonstrates considerable peak time congestion issues immediately off these junctions, not least with traffic gaining access to or exiting this section. This need is compounded by very significant housing development growth locally. Traffic access to the A12 to and from Maldon in this locality is an acknowledged serious problem. ECC Highways traffic modelling has confirmed peak time over capacity at the junction of the B1019 and B1137 junction within 100 metres of A12 junction 20b at Hatfield Peverel, and with site constraints there are no available amelioration options available.

There is an obvious, but unstated, imperative that alternative access to the A12 would be incorporated. Thus, there is the implication for a Maldon link road around the village from a remodelled Witham South A12 junction, and with village access to the A12 via this link road. This also implies confirmation of funding from other sources, including from ECC. This new junction arrangement presents a number of potential benefits including reduced flow through the village, removal of current slip road issues, and not least easing the Duke of Wellington junction problems, as well as, for north bound traffic, removing the volume/ hazards of cross traffic joining, then immediately leaving the A12, particularly in regard to Maldon–Witham /Braintree traffic.

Construction works will inevitably entail traffic disruption for the A12 and the village. Highways England will obviously be working on means to minimise this and no doubt would welcome further ideas from consultees together with possible alternative route options.

NDP progress report

The policy writing team has been busy since the consultation period finished at the end of September, reviewing the draft Plan following all comments received from residents and consultees.

The draft Plan was amended, and a meeting held with Braintree District Council on the 22nd November. A Steering Group meeting was held on the 24th November when the group made a presentation of the Plan, and discussed the next stages of the process.

The consultant has also now reviewed the Plan to ensure it meets with the basic conditions, and further slight amendments made. The consultant has also drafted the Basic Conditions Statement, and the group has started work on the Consultation Statement both of which need to be ready for examination with the Plan. All the comments received during the consultation period will be made available in the Consultation Statement.

A 'walkabout' of the parish was held in December to gather more evidence to support policy HPE6 'Protection of Important Views'. Thank you to everyone who attended or contributed towards this exercise. Thank you also to the library for allowing us to meet there and enjoy carols and refreshments. The group is now collating the information and photos to include in the data base as evidence to support the Policy. The group anticipates submitting the Plan to BDC under Regulation 14 early in March for consultation.

Application for 140 houses

If you have not already done so this is your final chance to object to Braintree District Council against Gladman's plan to build 140 houses on Stonepath Meadow. 

Goodbye Catherine

There are so many tales to tell, where to start? Catherine Voysey had such a diverse life. Full of great enthusiasm, she would try anything that interested her but unlike us, her volunteer work, pastimes, hobbies were not passing fancies, but friends for life!

Catherine was born on the mainland as her parents, who lived on Jersey with her brother, were evacuated at the beginning of the war (she was later awarded citizenship). When they returned home she spent her childhood on the island, moving back to the mainland where her brother was living, when she was eighteen. She was on holiday on the island when she met her future husband Martin.

She and Martin moved to Hatfield Peverel in 1968 where he formed the Peverel Path Society - because of his footpath work he was co-opted onto the Parish Council, later becoming chairman. After he died Catherine stood for election and later became herself chairman of an independent council as well as secretary of the PPS. Both were enthusiastic walkers and this led to her much loved 'Nine walks around Hatfield Peverel'. There is a covered map of the walks outside the library dedicated to Martin

Voysey which was unveiled by Catherine, and her daughter Fiona and grand daughter Rachel, in April 1994

when she was chairman of the council.



Her interests were wide: a competent driver of steam engines she was delighted at a local rally when she was at the regulator of one of the larger engines to hear a railway enthusiast say 'that engines too big for that woman' and getting the reply 'don't worry, she's used to driving full sized ones'. She loved sailing and canoeing, she taught swimming to Terling School pupils and our local school as well the Friday night swim, gardening - a believer in fresh produce, she grew magnificent vegetables and would send you home with a handful of something - and cooking (her biscuits were the best). And of course there were her beloved animals - many dogs of her own and friend to others, and horses (winter retreats at Botters Farm, summers in the field opposite her house sharing the grass with friends' horses).

Catherine's love was the WEA. At the Branch

AGM, she stood down as Branch Secretary after a long, happy association. In 1974 she had revamped the group and it was her enthusiasm and drive that has kept it going until this day, forty-two years later. As well as her work with the Hatfield Peverel Branch, she was Secretary of the Essex Federation Committee, and in 1989 she became the Essex County Organiser, a post she held until 2002. She organised annual Summer Schools: the first a 'Week of Study' held at the Essex University campus.



We enjoyed a slice of Catherine's special birthday cake, beautifully decorated with a picture of the village sign on The Green commemorating the millennium which Catherine helped put in place during her time with the Parish Council - *photo on left*. We also presented her with a picture of Ulting Church in appreciation of her work for WEA, and the village.

How we shall all miss you Catherine, your motto could be 'always get on with your life'.
