The Poppy - symbol of Remembrance



On a bright sunny day in early September 1921, an energetic 43-year-old French woman, Anana Guerin, presented herself at the British Legion headquarters in London. The subject was the Poppy.

She had been promoting the Poppy as a symbol of Remembrance in the United States since the end of the First World War and it was her wish to spread the idea to Britain and the Empire: she is probably the most important person in the story of the Remembrance Day Poppy. The Royal British Legion was formed in 1921, the Poppy has become its symbol, thanks to Anna Guerin.

The 2021 Poppy Appeal runs for two weeks leading up to Remembrance Sunday on the 14 November when a Remembrance Service will be held at St Andrews Church at 10.30am.

Much has happened in the intervening years - but many have dug, planted, tended their flowers and vegetables, kept fingers busy with knitting, embroidery and painting, clicked their cameras and taken to cooking. Long may it last, those home-baked cakes cannot be beaten!



The results were a joy: although the number of exhibits were down on previous years, the quality was outstanding - dahlias and chrysanthemums glowed against the back wall, fruit and vegetables were excellent - a combination of sun and rain kept everything growing. Handicrafts, too, were much admired - you've got six months plus to decide on your next years Spring winners. How about a photograph?

'The first of October is like New Year's Day to gardeners' - Monty Don

October is the beginning of the horticultural year. It is time to start planning and preparing for next spring and summer. What you do now – and some things that you do NOT do – will make a huge difference to your 2022 garden.

If your lawn and garden are your pride and joy, you cannot skimp on maintenance. Autumn is a crucial time for both lawn and garden care. Cooler weather doesn't mean you should stop cutting and watering your lawn. Doing so with regular leaf raking will allow sun and oxygen to reach the grass so it's not suffocated so your garden is healthy in the spring

Let it breathe - autumn is the perfect time to aerate your lawn as it allows water, oxygen, and fertiliser to reach the roots of your grass so it can better survive the winter.

- * Water your lawn one or two days before you plan on aerating and rent a mechanical core aerator.
- * Spread compost over aerated lawn to fill in holes and add nutrition to lawn.

Plant evergreens and shrubs - they need to establish their roots in these months before the winter freezes begin to help pollinators survive the winter. In addition to evergreens and shrubs, there are other things that you should plant in these transitional months:

* Spring bulbs including daffodils, dog's tooth violet, pansies, and glory-of-the-snow

* Cool season vegetables such as lettuce, radishes, and kale

Autumn flowers for pollinators - plant autumn pollinator flowers in your garden and around your yard to help refill their supplies so they can survive the winter. Some great flowers for pollinators include:

* Goldenrod - purple aster - Joe Pye weed - Bugbane - Autumn joy sebum - or pineapple sage??

Start Autumn composting - it's the best time for beginning your compost piles. Autumn leaves are the perfect base. And especially since it's the beginning of the busiest cooking season you'll have tons of food scraps and organic materials to throw out come the holidays.

A three-section compost system is perfect for home composting. One for fresh ingredients beginning to break down. The second for compost still decomposing. The third for compost ready to use when you are.

Invest in horticultural fleece and cloches. These are only useful if you employ them before you need them. Cloches are very good for rows of vegetables, keeping them dry as well as warm.

Save a fortune by collecting seeds from perennial plants using paper (not plastic) bags. Continue planting spring bulbs, but wait another month for tulips.

It is not too late to take cuttings and there is no more satisfying process in the garden if it is successful. Choose healthy non-flowering growth, use a sharp knife, and free draining peat-free compost - add an equal measure of grit or perlite to the compost.

You **can plant or move deciduous trees, shrubs and hedges** even if they are still in leaf as they have finished growing and the soil is still warm so the roots will begin to grow immediately. Give them a good soak and repeat this weekly until the ground is really wet, or the leaves have fallen. Deciduous plants can be moved/planted any time between October and the middle of March.

Sow sweet peas in October and you will have bigger plants with a stronger root system that should give flowers next spring earlier and longer lasting. These young plants will need storing and some protection over winter if the weather is bad. Sow some now and another batch in February and spread the risk.

The Parish Council has installed a second defibrillator in the village, paid for from the Essex County Councillor's Locality Fund. The two sites are:

The cabinets are locked, but the code will be provided by the ambulance service during a 999 call.

Another planning application for land between Priory Farm and the Sportsmans Arms!

Planning application : 21/02085/FUL Erection of a 4 bedroomed two-storey detached dwelling house with associated landscaping and parking. Land Adjacent To Priory Farm Cottages Sportsmans Lane, Nounsley.

Previous application attempts on this site have all been *down the footpath towards Sportsmans Lane* rejected, including a planning appeal that was dismissed by the Planning Inspectorate as recently as 2019.

This new application has proved somewhat contentious, with twenty seven objections lodged so far, including objections from the Parish Council.

The application is for a large luxury house situated in the countryside adjacent to footpath FP20 running alongside The Priory grounds between the Sportsmans Arms, Nounsley, and the churchyard/burial ground.

Objectors point out many things, including the intrusion into the countryside and the nice view across the Chelmer valley enjoyed by many walking the path here. These objectors suggest the two-storey glazed aspect would introduce significant light pollution, plus raise character concerns over converting countryside-land to domestic use.

The future of this site appears to hang in the balance. Should you wish to add your comments or opinions you can do so via the Braintree Council planning department website or email, using the planning reference number above. There is uncertainty about the closing date for submissions so please don't delay with yours. *From Kevin Dale*

From History to Wild Life Hadfelda WI - Marel Elliston

Who would have thought that Nounsley had once been home to a suffragette?

In August, Hadfelda WI's speaker was Hatfield Peverel's own historian, Margaret Freeman, who gave us a very interesting talk about the life of Grace Chappelow. Originally from Islington, Grace and her mother moved to Nounsley in about 1910 and Grace became interested in the suffragette movement. She attended rallies in Chelmsford where women such as Sylvie Pankhurst addressed the crowds. At one point Grace was sent to Holloway prison for smashing panes of glass in the Mansion House in London. On her release she smuggled out several items which now belong to Chelmsford Museum. The house where she lived in Nounsley is still occupied.

And for something completely different, our speaker in September was Liz Huxley who's talk

was entitled an 'Essex Diary – Wildlife through the Year' Liz illustrated her talk with beautiful photographs that she had taken featuring some of the flora and fauna to be found in Essex.

On a sunny afternoon in September, members visited Cressing Temple Barns where they wandered around the lovely gardens, followed by a delicious cream tea. And as we like to get out and about, in October some of us went off on a coach trip which took us to the interesting old town of Lavenham and then to a lovely old pub for lunch.

News from St Andrews Church

As I write I am thinking about petrol! Should I spend hours in a petrol queue or should I write something for the Review? The Review wins! There is a definite autumnal feel to the weather and the trees are beginning to lose their leaves. The horse chestnuts seem to be first this year and they produced very few conkers (*not in this neck of the woods Stephen! Ed*). Summer is well and truly over and the evenings seem much darker.



If nature is shutting down for the winter, the

opposite is happening in our churches. Both at All Saints and St Andrews we have had weddings, some postponed for a good 18 months. They have brought lightness and optimism to our churches because they are very much about new life, not just to the churches but to the community. The Church of England wedding service makes it clear that weddings are to do with the life of the community as well as the couple. I have also had one or two baptisms which again are about new life.

Although we have to be mindful about Covid, we finally had our twice-postponed coffee morning at the beginning of September. Refreshments were served in the Church Hall as usual but stalls were moved into the church to create space for separating the tables. Sadly, we could not have scones because of difficulty involved in preparing them to individual requirements, so we had lots of different cakes, keeping them under cake covers until sliced. The main thing was seeing people getting together and enjoying each other's company.

St Andrews has just had Harvest Thanksgiving and, as usual, we supported the Braintree and Witham Foodbank. The church was lovingly decorated by our Flower Guild (big thanks to them) and as well as the morning Parish Eucharist we had Choral Evensong. Our Reader Charles Cope preached and the choir sang a Harvest Anthem by the 18th century composer Maurice Greene.

We are also supporting WaterAid, a charity we have supported in previous years. Normally we would collect for it before Harvest, usually June/July, and make our offerings at the Harvest service. As we could not do this because of Covid, envelopes for gifts were made available at our Harvest services with the intention of collecting them up on Advent Sunday. For those of you who want to know a bit more about WaterAid, very briefly it is a charity dedicated to providing clean water to communities that either have no water at all, or the water they do have is contaminated with human and animal waste. Sometimes it may be miles away and those who job it is to collect it are often children who themselves have been weakened by water-borne diseases and consequent dehydration. There is a terrible irony here; that which is supposed to quench thirst can have the opposite effect. Advent Sunday is the 28 November and our service will be at 10.15am.

Looking to the future, we hope to maintain our monthly Coffee Mornings (Covid permitting) on the first Saturday of the month between 10am and 12 noon. 2021 **Dates will be Saturday 6 November and Saturday 4 December**
