We never knew Hatfield Peverel existed until we came looking for somewhere to live in late 1962. Number 19 Willow Crescent, a small fraction of the crescent, was two years old, the last bungalow of that part of the development. (The remaining part of the development, where we now live, was finally completed in the mid '70s.) The footpath to the railway station ran alongside our garden - fences in those days were two strands of wire and posts - and we got to know the regulars. We loved the giant elm tree in the corner of the front garden, later to be taken by Dutch elm disease, though the lawn itself suffered the bricks and rubble of the 'last house in the line' and had to be replaced.

In those sixty years much has changed, the village has got bigger, obviously, from around 3,000 in the early '60s to possibly around 4,000 to 5,000 now, but we love it here and hope those who like us are a bit long in the tooth, those who have joined - and are joining - feel the same.

Welcome to all you newcomers - nothing is ever perfect and 2+ years of Covid have made many nervous about coming out but - come and give us a try by joining in.



NDP Report October 2022

The review of the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) is still progressing.

As previously reported in the April Review, the Parish Council agreed to revise the document to bring it up to date, to ensure policies were robust and to reinstate, where possible, policies that were taken out by the Examiner back in 2019, and generally enhancing the Plan.

An updated report is presented at each monthly Parish Council meeting but the group agreed a report should again be provided via The Review.

The NDP group attended the Annual Parish Meeting in May, and also Party in the Park in June to engage with residents and to answer any questions. A copy of the draft NDP and other documents were available for viewing at PIP.

Work is continuing on the Plan with assistance of Braintree District Councils Planning Policy Officers, DAC Planning Consultants and Place Services. It is anticipated the document will shortly be ready for an independent health check before Regulation 14 Consultation where residents and statutory consultees will have the opportunity to make comment.

Meanwhile the History Group working under the NDP has carried out many engagements in the Parish; details have been regularly reported via The Review and on social media. Work by the Heritage Warden and the group is also linked to providing an evidence base for the reinstatement of a Heritage Policy. The Landscape Character assessment is currently also being reviewed, a

draft of this document is anticipated very shortly.

Further funding has been secured via Locality to help with technical detail of the review including preparation of new Basic Conditions and Consultation Statements along with a final review of the Plan by our Consultants prior to examination.

Although progress is slow, the group believes the review is addressing all the issues that were of concern and tightening up policies. They are aiming to have the Plan adopted in Spring 2023.

When will something be done?

Regular users of the short length of the path from Laburnum Way up towards The Street (between numbers 14 and 16 Laburnum Way) have doubtless been thinking 'when are they going to do something about this appalling surface?'. It's a vital footpath link between Laburnum Way, Willow Crescent and adjoining roads to the rec' (the park), New Road and the wider parts of the community.

The problem is this small section of public footway was never sold to anyone by the developers Hey and Croft in the '70s when the estate was completed, and now Hey and Croft no longer exist.

The parish council's Traffic Advisory Group is now actively investigating how to get this approximately 17m (18yd) into public ownership and maintainable at public expense by ECC Highways. This is proving to be a difficult and long-winded process but progress IS being made.

Exciting times continue for our Hatfield Peverel Village Hall

Improvements are continuing at the hall. We've acquired upholstered seating for the hall and meeting rooms, replacing the old hard plastic ones. Most of the repainting is now complete and we've had great feedback from a recent wedding hire where the 'dressed' set-up for the hall was really well received. The hall stage lighting is also being upgraded, so if you are coming to one of our forthcoming shows, you'll see some great lighting effects to compliment to music and drama.

The Community Café remains open weekdays from 9-11 in the mornings and 2:30-5 in the afternoons so do pop in for teas, coffees, soft-drinks, cakes and ice-creams. **The EMC club meets every Wednesday, 1-3pm**, is open to everyone and remains very popular; at just £3 for refreshments and entertainment it's the best value and friendliest ticket in the village.

In all there are nearly 20 different groups and activities at the hall – to see them all, go to the clubs page on our website at www.hatpevvhall.org.

We have our first Comedy club night in the Lounge Bar on Friday, 14 October with 'Bedtime Stories for Grown-ups' – come along and have a drink and laugh! If it proves popular, we hope to make this a monthly event in the lounge. We have some fabulous tribute acts coming up including 'The Post Floyd Dream' and 'The ELO Encounter' It's really no exaggeration to say these acts are as good as the real thing – if you saw the excellent 'Orbison Project' at the beginning of October, you'll know what we mean.

Looking ahead to December, we have a special production of 'The Nutcracker and the Mouse King' from 'This is my Theatre' group and we'll be booking in more soon; **and save the date (Sunday 11 December) for this years Christmas in the Park, which will feature Santa's grotto, real reindeer, a magician, live music and more.** Come along and help support the hall charity by coming along to any of these events if you can. If you'd like to get involved, please send us an email or pop into the lounge and have a chat.



Historic path unveiled

The official unveiling of the York flagstone path on Priory Grange took place on Wednesday 12 October 2022.

Representatives of the Parish Council, who commissioned the path, and Bellway, who installed it, worked closely together to bring about this successful outcome. They assembled at Priory Grange for the unveiling of the display panel, and to read the sign panel which explains the historic significance of the path. The York flagstones themselves formed part of the Bellway development scheme.

Heritage Warden for Hatfield Peverel Parish Council Margaret Freeman said: 'The York Flagstones were laid in the late 1800s as an all-weather walking surface across the meadow, acting as a physical link between Church Road and Hatfield Place. It is important the flagstones are now protected, preserved and explained for parishioners.'

The York Flagstone path is a significant part of Hatfield Peverel's cultural heritage and past.

Many villagers have watched with interest the progress of Priory Grange. The unveiling of the interpretive signage for this historic path will interest both newcomers and those who have lived here for many years.





News from St Andrews and All Saints



Normally at this time of the year I would be speaking about the season of Autumn, Harvest and related topics. This has paled into insignificance with the death of our Queen and the obsequies that followed it. All our churches in the Deanery, not just us, decided to move or re-arrange services to acknowledge this event. As the Queen is effectively the Lay Head of the Church of England, the authorities sent us all a service with suggested hymns and music which clearly had the imprint of our Queen on it. There were extracts from Morning Prayer or Mattins (apparently the Queen's favourite service) and traditional hymns. One of these was 'The Lord's my Shepherd' (Psalm 23) to the tune 'Crimond' and I realised that we rarely sing this in church because we clergy sing it all the time at the crematorium. This is very different from when I was a chorister in the 1960s at St Andrew's, Rochford. 'The Lord's my Shepherd' and 'All Things Bright and Beautiful' were associated with weddings; 'Abide with Me' and 'The Day Thou Gavest' were thought of as funeral hymns.

As we might have expected, there was wall-to-wall coverage of every aspect of the Queen's life, sometimes a little speculative, but at St Andrews and All Saints we concentrated on her spiritual life. Unlike America, where presidents are always referring to God publicly, the Queen did not. Her spirituality or, as I prefer to call it, what grounded her and informed her approach to people and situations, is to be found in her many Christmas broadcasts where she can be more personal. Even a cursory trawl through these demonstrates that service to individuals, the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth and being "sent out" to foster peace and friendships; this was how her Christian beliefs worked out in practice, and we give thanks for that.

Back to Harvest, by the time this Review is published, both churches will have had Harvest celebrations. This year, as last, we will be supporting the Braintree and Witham Foodbank, the demands on its resources have never been greater and this is likely to continue if inflation continues at the rate it is currently. On Sunday 25 we had a Confirmation Service at All Saints. In a sense, this is a form of harvest; our candidates are the first fruits of a process that has enabled them to say 'Yes' to their faith and we, the congregation, heard them say exactly that; the Bishop of Colchester 'confirming' it by anointing and the laying on of hands.

The marquee was ideal - a big thank you to Charles and his team for setting it up and to everyone who provided refreshments.

Christianity and the Commonwealth Games

One service in August was based on the theme of the Commonwealth Games which many of us were following and enjoying. Jeff asked if we could see any resemblance between the athletes and ourselves and could we learn anything from these competitors that we could use in our Christian lives.

We looked at some of the people taking part:

Gareth Thomas crashed in the cycling time trial, dislocated his shoulder but carried on – would we continue after such a disaster? He trains 37 hours a week - how much time do we give to our Christian faith?

Sarah Storey – competed first as a swimmer in 1992 and switched to cycling in 2005 and has now won 28 Paralympic medals.

Zoe Smith - a similar change was made when she moved from gymnastics to weightlifting and achieved medal success in her new sport. Do we restrict ourselves to one role or way of worshipping and remain reluctant and hesitant to try something new?

Adam Peaty – lost his first 100m breaststroke race for 8 years at the Games – but accepted the deep disappointment and came back 3 days later to win gold in the 50m race. He had learnt how to accept failure and use it to prepare for future races. We also should learn from setbacks and be sympathetic and supportive to others who may be struggling.

Being first is not necessarily the aim – being part of a team and working together for a common purpose is often easier and more rewarding

Competitors at the Commonwealth Games were aged between 17 and 76 – there are no restrictions in age to be part of a Church and age should not be offered as an excuse to stand back. Our children became very competitive racing Hex bugs and made medals to celebrate their achievements.

Summer holiday club

During the school holiday we ran a Tuesday morning holiday club for our children with weekly Bible stories and activities. We used Jesus casting fishing nets into the sea, calming the storm, feeding the 5000, and the parable of the wise and foolish builders. From the Old Testament we used Noah's Ark. Activities included making flapping fish, decorated clay fish made percussion instruments, raft making from recycled materials which were tested in a paddling pool, Lego houses to withstand the storm (or not) and making bread. We finished with a Treasure Hunt.

The weather was lovely and the children enthusiastically joined in and enjoyed the activities including the bigger kids (aka adults) who couldn't resist having a go. **Thank you to John and Jenny for offering your garden, one of the mums for providing delicious cakes and to the volunteers who led the sessions.**

As always it is not just the exercise of walking and attractive countryside that make these walks so enjoyable but the chance to have interesting conversations at the same time.


