

Sport in the Village

Our free outdoor gym sessions came to an end in February. 
NEWS FROM ST. ANDREW'S & ALL SAINTS, ULTING

The snow drops have been spectacular this year though by the time of reading this, will no doubt be over. We hope you had a chance to see them.

We had a good February, starting with Candlemas (the presentation of Christ in the Temple) marking the end of the Christmas period and then moving towards Lent with Shrove Tuesday and pancake celebrations. This is the day celebrated as Mardi Gras in many parts of the Christian world (think of Rio de Janeiro!). Then Ash Wednesday itself when traditionally parishioners around the world have the sign of the cross made on their foreheads with ashes as a mark of the first day of Lent and 40 days of fasting and penance, culminating with Easter Sunday - the most important festival in the Christian calendar.



Each year during Lent we have house discussion groups choosing different relevant themes. This year, we based the discussions on issues raised in the film of *Les Misérables* which we showed in St Andrew's church hall before the groups met for the first time. It has proved a most interesting choice, and very different from last year's film *Chocolat*!

Special Sundays in Lent include Mothering Sunday (March 15th), Passion Sunday (March 22nd) and Palm Sunday (March 29th). On the Saturday before Mothering Sunday (originally a day for people to visit their "mother church" evolving into a day, allowing servants time off to visit their mothers) we shall meet in St Andrew's church hall to bunch daffodils in readiness for handing out on the Sunday to members of the congregation. We shall also make the traditional Simnel Cake.

Following Mothering Sunday, Passion Sunday is observed on March 22nd, and Palm Sunday falls on March 29th, each bringing its own unique traditions and reflections as we journey through Lent.

Passion Sunday is so named because it marks the beginning of "Passiontide," a two-week period in the Christian calendar focused on the *passio* (Latin for "suffering") of Jesus Christ. Traditionally, it was the fifth Sunday of Lent, signalling the start of the final, intense contemplation of Jesus's journey to the cross.

Palm Sunday Palm is named for the palm branches that people laid on the ground and waved to welcome Jesus Christ during his triumphal entry into Jerusalem. It commemorates the final week of Jesus' life (Holy Week), transitioning from the celebration of Jesus as King to reflection on his death and during the service we shall distribute small crosses made of palm to the congregation.

Why is it called Simnel Cake?

One story says that the cake was invented by a couple, Simon and Nelly. They had set about making a cake to mark the end of Lent, using some leftover plum pudding from Christmas. Simon thought they should boil the cake, and Nelly was convinced it should be baked. After a brief domestic disagreement they compromised, deciding to boil the cake first and then bake it. And this happy union of baking methods produced a cake that became named after both of them - the Sim-Nel cake! Anyway, it is a fruitcake distinguished by layers of marzipan, typically one in the middle and one on top, and a set of eleven balls made of marzipan representing the 12 apostles minus Judas Iscariot, and we shall eat it after the service on Mothering Sunday.



We are also looking forward to our next Family Event which has an Easter theme and takes place on Palm Sunday (29th March). There will be lots of creativity in Room 3 of the Village Hall and a visit from the puppetry team too! Shrove Tuesday signals the beginning of the period of Lent – often with pancakes to enjoy! For some, Lent is a time of self-denial and ‘giving up’ of something, maybe chocolate? On Palm Sunday we celebrate and remember Jesus’ triumphant entry into Jerusalem, riding on a donkey. There must have been a party atmosphere with crowds shouting ‘Hosanna’ and welcoming him that day. The crowds and Jesus’ close friends (his disciples) could never have imagined the terrible events of Holy Week, and Jesus’ death on the cross, which we remember on Good Friday. But what joy they experienced, seeing him alive in person, just 3 days later. More than 2,000 years on we meet on Easter Sunday, 5th April at 9.15am, when we sing ‘Hallelujah – Christ is risen!’ Why not join us to celebrate?

THE LOVIBOND COTTAGES – A LASTING GIFT OF CARE TO HATFIELD PEVEREL

In celebration of International Women's Day on 8th March and Mother's Day on 15th March, we take a look at a mother who's compassion and generosity improved the lives of so many in Essex.

You may have noticed the attractive row of cottages along Maldon Road in Hatfield Peverel. Known as the Lovibond Cottages, these almshouses were built in 1820 and remain a lasting reminder of one woman's generosity to the parish – and of a legacy shaped by family, loss, and care for others.

Almshouses have existed in Britain since at least the 10th century, providing homes for older or poorer members of the community. The Lovibond Cottages were built and endowed by Martha Lovibond in accordance with the wishes of her daughter, Harriet Catherine Lovibond, who died aged just 21. The cottages were intended to house two elderly married couples and two single residents who were either born in the parish or long-time inhabitants – offering security and dignity in later life.

Constructed of Gault brick with slate roofs, the cottages feature Gothic-style windows and retain much of their original character. They were granted Grade II listed status in 1986 and continue to be maintained by a charitable organisation. The charity remains active today, supporting residents over the age of 60 with close ties to Hatfield Peverel.

A Life Shaped by Family

Martha Lovibond (née Impey), born in 1770, was one of ten children in a prominent and well-connected family. Her early life was shaped by her father's career as Chief Justice in the court in Calcutta, during the colonial administration of India. Upon returning to England, she was exposed from an early age to both privilege and responsibility. As a member of early 19th

century London's social elite Martha married George Lovibond in 1793. As well as their house in Manchester Square, London, Martha Lovibond and her husband, George settled in Hatfield Peverel for a time with their two children, Harriet and George.

Martha was widowed in 1817, temporarily moving with her two children to Funchal in Madeira. There, Martha suffered further tragedy the following year with the death of her daughter Harriet. It is likely that this personal loss influenced her return to the UK and her later philanthropy. Rather than withdrawing from society, Martha channelled her grief into helping others, particularly the young and the vulnerable. She moved back to England, and lived for a short period in Hadleigh, Essex. In 1820, she established the almshouses in Hatfield Peverel according to the wishes of her daughter and while in Hadleigh she became concerned by the poverty and lack of education among local children.

In 1821 she gave £750 in 4% Bank Annuities for "educating and clothing the poor children of the parish whose parents are members of the Church of

England". The charity was to be known as the Hadleigh (Essex) Sunday School Fund despite the fact that it was not just a Sunday school. The fund was intended firstly for instruction, but the remaining sum was to be spent providing warm clothing for the children at Christmas. Contemporary records describe her gift as generous and quietly given, without any desire for recognition – an act of care that reflected both maternal instinct and social responsibility.

Although the school later faced difficulties before eventually becoming successful in the 1840s, it went on to play an important role in local education until replaced by the National School in 1855. The Hadleigh charity itself was eventually de-registered in 1997.

A Legacy That Remains

Martha Lovibond died in Tunbridge Wells on 11 August 1828, aged 58, never seeing her educational project at its most successful. Yet her legacy endures. The almshouses she founded in Hatfield Peverel still stand today, continuing to provide homes for local residents more than two centuries later – a quiet but enduring example of compassion rooted in family and community.

She is remembered alongside her husband and son on a family monument in Hatfield Peverel's parish church, but perhaps her most lasting memorial is the care she extended beyond her own family, creating security and opportunity for generations she would never meet.

Spring Awakening: Making the Most of March and April on Your Plot



As the days lengthen and the soil finally begins to lose its winter chill, we enter the most exhilarating period of the gardening calendar. Late March and April are the “starting line” for the year ahead—a time when a little effort now yields a massive bounty come summer. Whether you are tending a backyard patch or a full allotment, here is how to navigate the spring rush.

The “Big Three” Preparation Jobs

Before the seeds go in, your soil needs to be ready to support them. Focus on these essentials:

- **Feed the Earth:** Apply a generous layer of well-rotted manure or our newly arrived garden compost. Don’t worry about digging it in deeply; the worms will do the hard work for you.
- **Warm the Bed:** Soil temperature is more important than air temperature. Use cloches or even black plastic sheeting to warm your seedbeds for a week before sowing; it significantly improves germination.
- **The “Scuffle” Weed:** Use a hoe on a dry, breezy day to decapitate annual weeds just as they emerge. This “stale seedbed” technique prevents them from outcompeting your young vegetables later.

THE ALLOTMENT CALENDAR

Late March	Tomatoes, Peppers, Chillies	Early Potatoes, Broad Beans, Peas
Early April	Cucumbers, Summer Cabbage	Onion Sets, Carrots, Parsnips
Late April	Squashes, Courgettes, Sweetcorn	Beetroot, Chard, Maincrop Potatoes

What to Sow and Plant Now

Timing is everything. While it is tempting to rush, remember that tender plants like tomatoes still need the protection of a sunny windowsill or greenhouse.

Direct into the ground:

- **Potatoes:** Plant “First Earlies” in late March and “Maincrops” in mid-April.
- **Root Crops:** April is prime for carrots, beetroot, and parsnips. Sow carrots thinly to avoid attracting the carrot fly during thinning.
- **Hardy Greens:** Spinach, chard, and lettuce can be sown in succession every two weeks for a continuous supply.

Under Cover (Windowsills/Greenhouses):

- **The Heat Lovers:** Start your tomatoes, peppers, and cucumbers now.
- **The Squashes:** Toward the end of April, sow pumpkins and courgettes in pots. They grow fast and hate frost, so keep them indoors until late May.

The “Hungry Gap” & Protection

This period is known as the “Hungry Gap”—the time when winter stores are finishing but new crops aren’t yet ready.

Pro Tip: Harvest remaining leeks and purple sprouting broccoli now to clear space. If you have fruit bushes, keep **horticultural fleece** handy. A sudden April frost can kill off the blossom on your strawberries or currants, ruining your fruit harvest before it begins.

Pest Watch: As the weather warms, slugs and snails will hunt for tender seedlings. Use organic grit or beer traps to protect your hard work.

Happy gardening—may your soil be crumbly and your harvests be heavy!




Hello from your local Terling WI!

FROM CAVALRY CHARGE TO D-DAY: THE ESSEX YEOMANRY


The story of the Essex Yeomanry is one that spans two world wars, tracing the journey of a county regiment from traditional mounted cavalry to modern artillery serving on the beaches of Normandy.

The Western Front Association returns to Hatfield Peverel Village Hall on Wednesday 11 March for its next meeting, which will focus on what was, in 1914, the Territorial Cavalry for Essex, The Essex Yeomanry.

Our speaker, Stephen Keoghane, served in a Yeomanry regiment himself as a medical officer, and his talk draws on his book *Shield & Protect – The Story of the Essex Yeomanry*. The evening will explore the regiment's service and achievements during both World Wars.

During the First World War, the Essex Yeomanry served with distinction on the Western Front, operating in both mounted and dismounted roles as the nature of the conflict changed. In 1915, their actions at Frezenberg helped halt a German offensive. The father of one of our members took part in this attack, and the accompanying photograph shows a memorial erected at the site a few years ago by the Essex Yeomanry Association.

The regiment was also involved in the successful cavalry attack on the strategic town of Monchy-le-Preux during the Battle of Arras in 1917. During this action, Harold Mugford – a former member of the regiment who had transferred, along with several others, to a Cavalry Machine Gun Company – was awarded the Victoria Cross for his heroism while operating his machine gun, despite being badly wounded. He survived the war and died in June 1958, later being honoured with a military funeral at Chelmsford Cathedral.



By the time of the Second World War, the Essex Yeomanry had evolved into an artillery role, serving in several theatres of operation. One of its component regiments went ashore in Normandy on D-Day in June 1944.

Our talk starts from 8pm. Members and non-members of the WFA are equally welcome. Any new visitors are guaranteed a friendly atmosphere and a warm welcome from a group of like-minded enthusiasts. We request an entrance donation of £4.00 and tea and coffee is available.

The Branch has a monthly newsletter which carries information concerning Branch talks and events, remembering casualties from Essex, historical articles and forthcoming events or publications that may be of use to anyone with an interest of the First World War.


AND THE OSCAR GOES TO...

The Oscar season is in full swing with the awards show scheduled for 15th of this month and our own **21st season** continues to pull in the crowds with our membership reaching an all time high of 190. As a nod to the awards, we continue in March with the screening of last year's Oscar winner **A Real Pain** on Wednesday 11th March followed by the highly acclaimed **If Only I Could Hibernate** on 25th March.

A Real Pain follows two polar opposite cousins from the USA who join a Jewish WW2 history tour in Poland to see the significant places in the life of their beloved but recently deceased grandmother who survived the Holocaust. David (played by Jesse Eisenberg) is introverted, responsible and neurotic whilst Benji (Kieran Culkin) is extroverted and seemingly carefree. Unfortunately their contrasting personalities start to cause friction between the two and old tensions gradually resurface. At last year's Oscars, Kieran Culkin won Best Supporting Actor for his portrayal of Benji, while the film, written and directed by Jesse Eisenberg was also nominated for Best Screenplay.

Our second film in March, **If Only I Could Hibernate**, tells the story of a poor but somewhat arrogant teenage boy, Ulzil, who is determined to win a Physics competition for a scholarship. However, the problem he faces is that in the middle of winter his illiterate mother finds a job in the countryside and leaves him with his siblings.

Looking forward, our films for April 2026 are the Oscar nominated **A Complete Unknown** which tells the story of Bob Dylan's meteoric rise to fame and the highly acclaimed 2024 Mike Leigh drama, **Hard Truths** starring Marianne Jean-Baptiste.



Our 21st season continues until 3rd June 2026 with films being shown fortnightly on Wednesdays at Maldon Town Hall. Doors open at 7.15pm, and wine and soft drinks are available at a charge from 7.30pm. Unless notified to the contrary, all films commence at 8pm.



EXERCISE TIP OF THE MONTH: GLUTE BRIDGE



The glute bridge is a simple but effective exercise that strengthens the hips, lower back, and core—key muscles for walking, standing, and overall stability.

How to Do It:

- **Start Position:** Lie on your back with knees bent and feet flat on the floor, hip-width apart.
- **Lift:** Push through your heels and lift your hips towards the ceiling.
- **Squeeze:** Gently squeeze your glutes at the top and keep your core engaged.
- **Lower:** Slowly lower your hips back down with control.
- **Repetitions:** Aim for 10–15 reps, 2–3 sets.

To progress, hold the top position for a few seconds or perform the movement on one leg.

TIPS FOR YOUR GARDEN IN MARCH



Continue to tidy your garden; in particular look out for weed seedlings that can establish as the warmer weather hopefully heads our way!

In March, protect nesting birds by avoiding hedge trimming and heavy pruning, as birds like robins and blackbirds start nesting early.

Install nest boxes, provide materials like moss or twigs, and keep pets indoors if fledglings are spotted. Keep feeders clean and provide water to support breeding pairs.

Prune:

Continue to cut back roses at the beginning of the month. Cut dogwoods, cotinus and willow down to the base to promote new growth. Pick off seed heads from daffodils and other spring bulbs but leave the foliage to die back naturally.

Plant:

Lillies and other summer flowering bulbs can be planted this month, as can a wide variety of shrubs, roses and climbers. March is also a good time to sow wildflower seeds in trays to later plant out for a stunning summer meadow display.

Propagate:

Divide large clumps of snowdrops and aconites to enable new healthy plants for next year. Take basal cutting for perennials such as delphiniums to root in a warm environment such as a heated greenhouse. Cutting can also be taken now from dahlia tubers.

A MEMORABLE MEETING IN FEBRUARY THEN TALES FROM THE RIVERBANK IN MARCH

We predicted February's meeting of the Wine Club – a South African supper honouring the anniversary of Nelson Mandela's release – would be one of the highlights of the Club year, and it was – although not necessarily for all the right reasons! Attendance was excellent – 55 people, some trying us out for the first time, including one actual South African; the starters of various patés (*snoekfish*, *kudu* and *brinjal*, aka mackerel, venison and aubergine) went down well, as did the eagerly-anticipated *koeksisters* (bearing an uncanny resemblance to Lidl's delicious toffee YumYums!); the wines were enjoyable and excellent value for money – but two things were missing from the evening!

What were they? Firstly, the oven in the Village Hall went on strike and refused to heat up, meaning that we couldn't taste that perennial favourite, South Africa's national dish of bobotie. Secondly, our guest speakers were prevented from coming at very short notice because of a family emergency, leaving us literally speechless! Luckily, Steve Spearman rose magnificently to the occasion and gave us the Thoughts of Chairman Steve on South African Wine, based on some intensive impromptu study of the bottle labels and memories of his 2014 wine tasting trip to the Cape Winelands. Members remained in good spirits throughout the evening however, bravely staving off their hunger pangs with some healthy and nutritious salad and bread, washed down with consoling sips of wine. We are happy to report that the Hall team at HPVH has leapt swiftly into action like the well-oiled machine it is to deal with the recalcitrant oven, for which many thanks.

It was a close-run thing for favourite white wine of the evening, with the **Rustenberg Sauvignon Blanc** from Stellenbosch emerging triumphant; **Vergelegen's Mill Race Red Blend** was the preferred red. The surprise hit of the evening was a dessert wine from online wine merchant www.southafricanwines.co.uk which we had thought might be a bit of a Marmite wine: **Darling Cellar's Winemaker's Selection Wildflower Hanepoot Jeripigo, a snip at £10.99** for a full-size bottle, which was a perfect accompaniment for the YumYums, sorry *Koeksisters*!

We are hopeful of a more tranquil evening in March, flowing calmly along like one of the great wine rivers

of the world which are the subjects of the meeting. The topic, Tales of the Riverbank, will be introduced by the lovely Neils Dubro of Street Wines in Colchester (www.streetwines.co.uk), one of the Club's favourite external presenters.



Free Tennis for All – and a Chance to Get Involved

For the past two years, Hatfield Peverel Parish Council has been pleased to offer free outdoor gym training sessions at the Strutt Memorial Recreation Ground. While funding for those sessions has now come to an end, we are delighted to be introducing something new from April – **Barclays Free Park Tennis**, a national scheme offering free, friendly tennis sessions for anyone who would like to take part.

To make this happen locally, we are still looking for a small group of volunteers to join us as **Tennis Activators**.

If you're worried that you need coaching experience, please don't be – there's no coaching involved. Activators simply help welcome players, set up equipment, and keep the session running smoothly

so everyone has a good experience. You don't need to be a tennis expert, or even a regular player – just someone who enjoys being involved and supporting others.

To run safely, each session requires two activators, and we hope to build a small team of four to six volunteers so that the commitment is shared. Even helping occasionally would make a real difference.

- Around two hours of online training, including safeguarding
- An LTA DBS check
- A friendly and reliable approach
