Fireworks Night, Bonfire Night, the 5th of November - whatever name you know this date by there's no doubt that you probably know what it's about.

Government intrigues, religious upheavals, and clandestine schemes?! That's the essence of Bonfire Night. And while it may appear as a time for the community to gather around a massive bonfire and ooh and aah at the pretty fireworks while savouring sausage baps, its history runs deeper than mere festivities.

It still forms part of the primary curriculum though these days you might see less schoolchildren around with a stuffed effigy and asking, "penny for the guy". There's even been a resurgence of Guy Fawkes's story with the <u>Gunpowder Plot</u> at the Tower of London and Guy Fawkes' Gunpowder Plot at <u>The London Dungeons</u> - both well worth a visit.

The 1605 plot to assassinate the king was foiled by a warning letter, leading to the capture of Guy Fawkes and his fellow conspirators. Though the idea wasn't originally his, Fawkes became the most famous figure. Following the discovery, bonfires were lit across Britain in celebration, and in 1606, Parliament declared November 5th a day of thanksgiving.

Though the act was repealed in 1859, more than 400 years later, Bonfire Night traditions continue across the UK with communities gathering around bonfires and revelling in displays of fireworks.

MEET THE COUNCILLORS

This month we got to chat with Councillor Richard Parker for our Meet the Councillors series. We found out what he's passionate about and some of the good work he's been part of during his first year on the council.

Village Voice (VV): How long have you been part of the parish council?

Richard Parker (RP) I joined last November, so just a year for me.

VV: Where did you grow up? What's your background and what brought you to Hatfield Peverel?

RP: I grew up in Chadwell Heath and have lived in Romford and Wickford while working at Dagenham and then Dunton for Ford. Thanks to Ford, I've been lucky enough to also live and work in Cologne, Germany and for a time in Ann Arbor, Michigan. I started working for Ford as an apprentice and spent 24 years there before I left to start my own consulting business and sometimes ran other people's business for them as Managing Director. I then "retired" at 55 running a side hustle which became a business. For the last 15 years, my wife and I have lived in Nounsley. My sister encouraged me to join her in Hatfield Peverel, though when I discovered there were 6 pubs in the village, that pretty much decided it!

VV: How did it come about that you joined the parish council?

RP: I had been at Ford for nearly 24 years. I didn't want the watch for 25 years of service so I left and worked on the side hustle I had going at the same time as working for other people in senior roles, but the side hustle became

more of a full-time business. I wanted to give more of my time to volunteering in the area so I became a Section Support Leader for the Scouts which I've been doing for over five years now. As my business progressed, I built up an efficient team that could run the business for me which left me with more time to volunteer. My friend and now fellow councillor, Mark Weale, invited me along to a council meeting and I thought I'd pop along and see what it was all about. Let's just say he can be very persuasive! But I did want to get more involved with the goings on in the village so I joined the parish council.

I can totally understand how reluctant people are to join the council - there's a worry that you'll be roped into committing loads of time to various projects and that it'll be hard to say no. But your life experiences and skills can always bring something good and help to improve the council and you definitely don't have to devote more time than you can commit to. The more diverse the council is, the better it serves the community. If you're volunteer minded, the PC is a great way to give back and improve the community. It can really give you a sense of purpose too; when you volunteer you're essentially choosing to do whatever you want, and seeing the results from that gives a huge sense of achievement.

VV: What particular areas are you involved in within the council?

RP: I was reluctant at first to join any subcommittees but I found that once on the council and with my background in Scouting, I was drawn towards improving village life for our youth. I wanted to do more for them in the community, especially in rural areas.

I'm proud to say that Hatfield Peverel Parish Council is now offering the first community Duke of Edinburgh award scheme in the country. We're holding a launch event on 30th October for DofE and from November we're hoping to sign up a group of local young people who might not otherwise be offered this through their school. We're supported by The Essex DofE and there's no financial outlay from participants. Sadly, a lot of schools aren't able to offer it to all students as it's costly for them so we want to target those in the village who may not have been offered this type of opportunity.

VV: What are your hopes for the future of the council?

RP: We would really like to get the younger element of the village involved more in the council. We'd like to introduce perhaps a youth committee element that could bring ideas to the main council. We found that during the covid lockdowns, so many kids lost their confidence and are more reluctant to engage with activities outside of the house. But we'd like to hear their voices. To help us shape the village for the future. Like all generations before us, our youngsters are generally given a bad name and improving opportunities for this age group is a priority for me.

I'd love to see more people get involved in the council in general. Just come to the PC meeting once a month - immediately you'll become involved in what's going on.

Any points you want to raise we'd welcome to hear them. The parish council strives to make the area a good and better place to live in and we need everyone's help on that.

VV: When you're not working on council matters, how do you relax, what hobbies do you enjoy?

RP: I love listening to live music - one of the reasons I love Hatfield Peverel. The local pubs put on some great bands and musicians. I'm a real fitness enthusiast - I work out a lot and you can often see me using the outdoor gym at the Strutt Memorial Ground. I've been training in self defence for 15 years and I absolutely love rugby. A previous injury means I can no longer play but I enjoy being a spectator. I shall be following the British Lions tour in Australia next year. And I love podcasts! There's so much interesting stuff out there. I don't read as much anymore because there's some great podcasts to listen to.

VV: What's your favourite thing about Hatfield Peverel or the surrounding areas?

RP: It's got to be the pubs here in HP. They make the place so much better. They're not just pubs but real meeting places and community places. And the live music is great. I've had a lot of memorable moments down the pub which I probably shouldn't really talk about here! I've got to know so many people locally by going to the pubs in the village and when my wife and I started volunteering we got to know so many more. There's such a strong community spirit here in the village which I've never experienced elsewhere. What the parish council have done with the village hall now, it really is the centre of the village.



APPROACHING WINTER

As colder temperatures signal the approach of winter, now is the time to shift your focus in the garden towards preparing for next year. While there may still be a few crops left to harvest, most of your attention will be on tidying up - removing weeds and managing any overgrowth.

Winter prep could mean covering the soil with black plastic, cardboard, manure or even compost from your compost bins. Winter cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, kale, Jerusalem artichokes, leeks, turnips and swede are all ready to pick over the next few weeks. Beetroot, radish and lettuce may still be harvested. Dig up the last of your main crop potatoes. Pick your pears and bring them indoors to ripen. Hoe now to control your weeds and lead to an easier start in the spring. Weeds grow automatically, prolifically and easily with no encouragement from any sources.

Allotment Maintenance

You may have noticed that your committee has been busy with year-end maintenance. The toilet has been repainted, the top hedge trimmed, and the water turned off for the season. Plot 1 has been treated, and the manure and woodchip bins are set to be resized. Additionally, the pond area will be tidied and expanded, providing a relaxing space for members to enjoy.

November's Gardening Jobs

Here are some jobs you can be getting on with on the allotment in November.

- Plant garlic, onions and shallots. They're all easy to grow. Shallots and onions are grown from tiny bulbs, known as "sets", and garlic is grown from cloves. Cover with fleece to protect them from the worst of the weather.
- Prune Blackcurrants, redcurrants, white currants and gooseberries any time between November and March, while they are dormant.
- Cut down autumn-fruiting raspberries to the ground once they have finished fruiting, between November and March.
- Net brassicas to protect crops from hungry pigeons.
 Use mesh that lifts clear, otherwise, birds will peck through it.
- Stake Brussels sprouts as they can get top-heavy and topple in heavy winds.
- Harvest crops including carrots, celery, cabbages, Brussels sprouts, celeriac, and cauliflower.

Year-end wrap up

As of the end of September, all rents and fees will have been collected and recorded. Many plots have been vacated due to job changes, health, age, and other factors. Your committee has been hosting potential new members and our waiting list has been active. We do have a few plots still available.

To show interested people around, we suggest half a plot for beginners and a full plot if you are experienced. Fees are £6.00 for members and partners or £3.50 for associate members plus yearly plot rental fees of £27.50 for half plots and £55.00 for full plots.

The charity was started 25 years ago by Helen Rollason, former BBC Grandstand presenter (and the first female presenter on Grandstand) when she was diagnosed with cancer. She sadly passed away in 1999 but the charity continues to support local people with cancer.

What's next?

November is an important month for the Western Front Association. Remembrance is a major part of the objectives of the Association. Each year, on Armistice Day, 11th of November the WFA hosts a Remembrance Service at the Cenotaph, in Whitehall, at 11am to coincide with the exact time that the guns on the Western Front fell silent in 1918.

This is a major event and there is often a very large crowd watching. There are representatives from the WFA, Government, Armed Forces, various affiliated civil and military association, schools, and cadet forces in attendance.

On Wednesday the 13th of November the Essex Branch of the Western Front Association returns to The Village Hall. Our speaker is **Alan Wakefield**, former curator of the Imperial War Museum, with a huge interest and expertise in the Balkans, South Europe, and Mesopotamia theatres of operation in the First World War.

His talk is 'A Long Way From France & Flanders - Experiences of British Military Personnel in South Russia 1916-1920'. British involvement in southern Russia is not widely known. This talk covers the Royal Naval Air Service armoured cars under Locker-Lampson and the various British forces sent to south Russia as part of the Intervention at the end of the First World War.

NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN UPDATE



Overall, there were 16 votes for the Waimea and 19 for Dark Corner, making Dark Corner the winner of the prestigious (ⓐ?) Peverel Wine of the Year Award 2024.

Our new Chairman, Steve Spearman, will be celebrating his dizzy rise to fame on 13th November by presenting a tasting of wines from the USA, an event sure to rival the excitement of the almost concurrent American Presidential Election results! We shall not, of course, be allowing politics to dominate the serious business of wine tasting, but by then we shall either be celebrating or drowning our sorrows, depending on the results!


20th SEASON IN FULL SWING

Our 20th season has got off to a tremendous start – great films and some 100 members coming along to each screening. The season continues with the screening of the award-winning **One Life** on Tuesday 5th November and **Pig** on Tuesday November 19th.

One Life, starring Anthony Hopkins, tells the true story of Sir Nicholas 'Nicky' Winton, a young London broker who, in the months leading up to World War II, rescued 669 predominantly Jewish children from the Nazis. Nicky visited Prague in December 1938 and found families who had fled the rise of the Nazis in Germany and Austria, living in desperate conditions with little or no shelter and food, and under threat of Nazi invasion. He immediately realized it was a race against time. How many children could he and the team rescue before the borders closed? Fifty years later, it's 1988 and Nicky lives haunted by the fate of the children he wasn't able to bring to safety in England; always blaming himself for not doing more. It's not until a live BBC television show, 'That's Life', surprises him by introducing him to some surviving children - now adults - that he finally begins to come to terms with the guilt and grief he had carried for five decades.

Pig, another award winning film, stars Nicolas Cage as Rob, a taciturn meditative hermit in the Oregon wilderness whose only companion is a truffle hunting pig. Rob's only income and outside contact comes from selling truffles every week to businessman Amir. When his pig goes missing Rob is inconsolable and only wants his best friend back. If necessary he will go to the edge of the world to find the pig even if this means returning to Portland and his past.





Our films for December are the highly acclaimed **Perfect Days** and **The Last Bus** starring Timothy Spall which is described as a heartwarming tale. Before the screening of **The Last Bus**, we shall be holding our first social of the season.

Our 20th season continues until 28th May 2025 with films being shown fortnightly on Tuesdays in 2024 and Wednesdays in 2025. BALANCE AND STABILITY

Exercise Tip of the Month: Single-Leg Stand

This month, I want to introduce you to the Single-Leg Stand, a simple exercise that can help improve balance, strengthen your core, and boost leg stability. It's easy to do at home and requires no equipment.

- Start Position: Stand near a sturdy surface, like a wall or the back of a chair, for support if needed. Keep your feet hip-width apart.
- 2. Lifting Phase: Shift your weight onto one leg and lift the other leg off the ground, keeping your hips level. Hold this position for 10-15 seconds.
- 3. Switch Legs: Lower the lifted leg and repeat the movement on the other side.
- 4. Progression: As your balance improves, try holding the position for longer or doing the exercise without support.
- 5. Repetitions: Aim to repeat the exercise 3-5 times on each leg.

This exercise is great for building strength in your legs and improving your balance over time. Start small and gradually increase the duration as you get stronger.

SEASONAL CHANGES, NEW CHALLENGES



Now that we're well into the Autumn we're faced with the inevitable weather changes so it's always a good idea to check your equipment to avoid being caught out. The days are shorter, temperatures have dropped, and leaves are falling so we need to make sure we have everything out and ready. I also use this as a reason do a little shopping and evaluate a few latest items.



FIREWORKS SEASON

We are fortunate to live in a beautiful part of Essex, surrounded by numerous walking routes and local dog-friendly businesses that welcome both you and your dog with open arms. I feel truly blessed to call Hatfield Peverel home. However, no matter how wonderful and dog-friendly your surroundings are, the 5th of November in the UK can be a particularly stressful time for our four-legged friends – and not just for dogs.

From autumn onwards, there are several occasions where fireworks are used. Here are a few tips to help manage your pet's anxiety during Bonfire Night and other events.

PREPARATION

Create a Safe Space: Set up a comfortable, quiet area in your home where your dog can feel secure. This can be a crate, a quiet room, or a cozy corner with their favourite blankets and toys.

Desensitise Early: Gradually expose your dog to firework sounds months in advance. Play recordings of fireworks at a low volume while providing treats and engaging in play to build positive associations.

Microchip and ID: Ensure your dog is microchipped and wears a collar with ID tags, in case they manage to escape during the fireworks.

DURING FIREWORKS

Stay Calm: Dogs can pick up on your anxiety. Stay calm and act normally.

Close Windows and Curtains: Muffle the sound of fireworks by closing windows and drawing the curtains. Playing soothing music or turning on the TV can help mask the noise.

Distract and Divert: Engage your dog with their favourite toys or games. You can also offer interactive toys that encourage focus and mental engagement.

Comfort, but don't coddle: It is okay to provide comfort, but excessive coddling can reinforce fearful behaviour. Instead, try to distract and engage them in normal activities.

LONG TERM STRATEGIES

Behavioural Therapy: Consider working with a professional dog trainer or behaviourist to develop long-term strategies for managing noise anxiety.

Thunder shirt or Pressure Wraps: These can provide comfort by applying gentle pressure, helping some dogs feel more secure.

Aromatherapy: Some dog owners find that pheromone sprays or diffusers, help to calm anxious dogs.

MEDICAL INTERVENTIONS

Sedatives or Anti-Anxiety Medications: In severe cases, consult your veterinarian about prescription medications that can help manage your dog's anxiety. Always follow your vet's guidance on dosage and usage.

Natural Supplements: Some natural remedies, like calming supplements, may help, but consult your vet before trying these options.

Remember, every dog is different. What works for one dog might not work for another, so it may take some experimentation to find the best approach for your pet. Your patience and preparation can make a significant difference in helping your dog feel safe and secure during fireworks.
