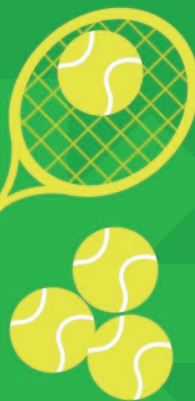

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## NEWS FROM ST. ANDREW'S & ALL SAINTS, ULTING

Happy New Year everyone from the clergy and parishioners of St Andrew's Hatfield Peverel and All Saints, Ulting.

We had a busy and joyous advent in the 24 days leading up to Christmas Day. We tried to deliver a Christmas card with details of our services to all homes in Hatfield Peverel. This was a massive effort and huge thanks go to all our deliverers. We are sorry if we missed some homes but got round to just under 2000!

Christmas services started on 7<sup>th</sup> December with Carols by Candlelight at All Saints with the Hadfelda Singers under the leadership of Barbara Mason. On the 14<sup>th</sup> our Messy Christmas service at St Andrews was entertained by a very grumpy owl! On the 21<sup>st</sup>, it was Carols at St Andrew's and then on Christmas Eve we had our hugely popular Light of the World Service at St Andrew's supporting Home -Start with gifts of toys and finance. This was followed later by our Midnight services welcoming the wondrous birth of Jesus. Our Christmas trees inside and outside our two churches were much admired and we hope gave pleasure to all who saw them.



Christian services celebrating the birth of Jesus don't just stop on Christmas Day. The Feast of the Epiphany, traditionally taking place on the 6<sup>th</sup> January, records the arrival of the three Wise men/ Magi/ Kings and so the revelation of Jesus to the world at large. That is also the day when Christmas decorations are traditionally taken down, but meantime this arrival can be celebrated by "chalking the doorway" of your house. If you have some woodwork above your front door, you can achieve this by chalking there the following for the year 2026 : **20+C+M+B+26** - C being Caspar, M being Melchior and B Balthazar, then see if anyone else has done the same!

## Could You Become a Tennis Activator?

Hatfield Peverel is hoping to bring a new community activity to the village in 2026 — Barclays Free Park Tennis, a national initiative designed to encourage people of all ages and abilities to enjoy free, friendly tennis sessions in local parks. To make this happen, we are looking for volunteers to step forward as Tennis Activators.

### What is Free Park Tennis?

The scheme offers weekly, book-in-advance sessions where anyone can turn up and play for free. No experience is needed and all equipment is provided. It's a simple way to get people moving, meet others in the community, and make good use of our local courts at the Strutt Memorial Recreation Ground.

Here in Hatfield Peverel, the plan is to run a one-hour session every Sunday morning, from April 2026 through to October half term. To run safely and smoothly, each session needs two activators present. Activators aren't coaches — their role is to welcome players, set up equipment, help the session flow and ensure everyone has a good experience.

### Who can be an Activator?

Almost anyone! You don't need to be a tennis player or have any sporting background. Barclays Free Park Tennis provides clear guidance, activity plans and all the tools volunteers need. What's required is:

- Around 2 hours of online training, including a short safeguarding module
- An LTA DBS check
- A friendly, encouraging attitude

To avoid the commitment falling on just one or two people, we are looking to train at least four new activators, ideally more. With a small team sharing the rota, the sessions remain enjoyable and manageable for everyone involved.

Becoming a Tennis Activator is a great way to support the village, meet new people and help provide an inclusive, healthy activity for the community.

# THE PINK HORSE OF HATFIELD PEVEREL

## A Wartime Tale from 1914–15

*When cavalry men, permanganate of potash, and one very unlucky horse made local history*

When the First World War broke out in August 1914, Hatfield Peverel became an unexpected temporary home for the Bedfordshire Yeomanry, a Territorial cavalry regiment mobilised for active service. By 27th August 1914 the regiment had moved to Winslow in Buckinghamshire. "From there a series of daily marches brought the regiment through Edlesborough, Codicote, Luton, Hertford, Epping Forest, South Weald and to finally reach Hatfield Peveril [sic]"\*. They were stationed here in Hatfield Peverel and Stansted from late 1914 until June 1915, before departing for France. Their presence left a lively, if fleeting, mark on the village.

Among the stories handed down in village memory is one that brought colour - quite literally - to those wartime days:

*"A detachment of the Bedfordshire Yeomanry was billeted in the village for three years in the 1914-18 War. When it was ordered abroad an officer who rode a white horse is reputed to have asked if anything could be done to make it less conspicuous. The story goes that the farriers painted the horse with a mixture of permanganate of potash, but unfortunately in the morning the horse was pink!"\*\**

### Did it really happen?

The Yeomanry's documented stay in Hatfield Peverel along with a long-lost image in the National Army Museum archives that I uncovered, means the setting of the story is unquestionably correct. The origin of this anecdote is the local heritage booklet of the parish, and although I have not been able to locate an official war-diary entry that

confirms this exact episode, it does sit well with the kind of improvisation and humour that soldiers often adopted in home service. Permanganate of potash otherwise known as Potassium permanganate was widely used at the time for cleaning and staining and may well have been in the stores of the regiment or farriers. It is known to stain hair and fur various shades of red and purple. In fact, there is a documented 1915 case (far from Essex, in the US Army) where a cavalry horse was dyed with permanganate to make it less visible.

What makes the tale enduring is not just its humour, but what it reveals about life in the village during the early months of the war. Hatfield Peverel's lanes, stables and fields would have perhaps been bustling with horses, troopers, kit, farriers' forges and unfamiliar routines. For residents, this sudden influx of uniformed activity must have felt extraordinary. And for the men themselves - living away from home, preparing for the battlefields of France - moments of comedy and camaraderie like this one may have provided much-needed relief.

# ADVENTURE IS OUT THERE!

**Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award – New Cohort Starting January 2026**

As reported in last month's issue, Hatfield Peverel Parish Council is preparing to run another Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) Bronze Award programme from January 2026, open to Hatfield Peverel students aged 14–19.

Hatfield Peverel remains the first parish council in Essex to offer the DofE Award directly, and we're pleased that even more local young people will have the chance to take part. The Parish Council funds the scheme, and two councillors – Cllr Richard Parker and Cllr Tina Short – lead the fortnightly training and review sessions held in the village hall.

## What's involved?

The DofE Bronze Award is widely recognised by colleges, universities and employers—not just for its prestige, but for the commitment, character and skills it helps young people develop.

Participants work toward three core sections over three to six months:

- **Physical** – taking part in regular exercise
- **Skills** – learning and developing a new ability
- **Volunteering** – giving time to support others in the community

The programme concludes with a two-day expedition involving hiking and camping, where teamwork, independence and resilience are put into practice.

If your child is aged 14–19 and either cannot secure a place through their school or does not have access to a school-run DofE scheme and are resident in Hatfield Peverel or have links to the village, we would be delighted to welcome them. 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# Winter Gardening: Small Steps for a Strong Start

When winter arrives, many gardeners close the shed doors until spring. But the quieter months are one of the most valuable times to stay connected to your garden or allotment. With a few simple habits, winter becomes a season of calm progress, gentle activity, and small wins that set you up for a flourishing year ahead.

## A Winter Boost for Your Well-Being

Fresh air and natural daylight are precious in winter. Even ten minutes outside—checking on a bed, topping up a bird feeder, or gathering fallen leaves—can brighten your mood and give you a lift on darker days. A quick purpose outdoors often does more good for us than we realise.

## Quick Jobs for Cold Days

Winter offers a leisurely pace. These simple tasks keep you connected without feeling like work:

- Clear away dead annuals and tidy pathways
- Remove a few obvious weeds before they settle in
- Add compost or mulch to empty beds
- Check pots for waterlogging and improve drainage if needed
- Secure plant ties and supports loosened by wind
- Refresh bird feeders and water sources

Small actions now prevent bigger jobs later—and make spring feel welcoming rather than overwhelming.

## Weekend Wins for Spring Success

If you've got a bit more time, winter is ideal for:

- Pruning fruit trees and dormant shrubs
- Planting bare-root fruit bushes, roses, or hedging
- Reviewing the shape of your borders while the structure is visible
- Sorting through seeds and planning your crop rotations
- Giving tools a clean, oil, and sharpening

These calm winter jobs often make the most significant difference in the long run.

## Find the Quiet Beauty

Winter gardens may be subtle, but they're full of charm. The glossy berries on holly, the coloured stems of dogwood, the fragrance of winter-flowering shrubs—there's always something to appreciate when you slow down and look closely. Winter teaches us to notice the gentle details we miss in summer.



## Grow a Little Something

Hardy winter vegetables like kale, leeks, winter cabbage, and purple sprouting broccoli thrive in the colder months. Even a pot of parsley or winter herbs by the back door can feel wonderfully rewarding.

## Plan, Dream, Prepare

Winter evenings are perfect for dreaming up next year's garden. Leaf through seed catalogues, sketch new ideas, and think about what worked well last year. This slower planning time often leads to more intelligent choices and stronger results in spring.

This winter, choose one small habit that keeps you connected to your garden. A few gentle steps now will set the roots for a vibrant, successful year ahead.

Nestled at the centre of our community, Omars has become a much-loved local favourite, a place where good food, warm welcomes, and familiar faces come together.

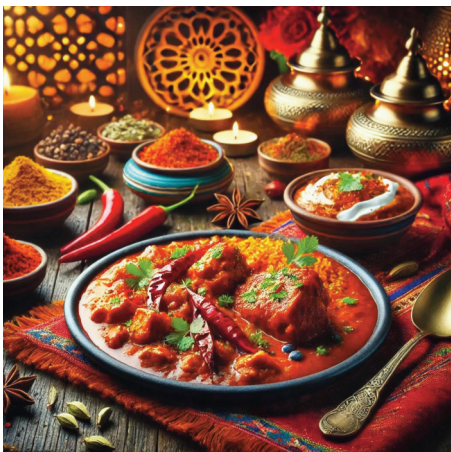

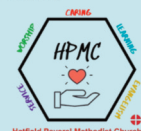

## WHEN WOMEN TOOK THE FIELD

May I begin our first article of 2026 by wishing all Village Voice readers a very Happy New Year on behalf of our Branch.

Our next talk at Hatfield Peverel Village Hall is on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> January where our subject will be *football* – not something that readily springs to mind when it comes to WWI apart from stories about the Christmas Truce in 1914.

Our speaker on this topic is Steve Bolton. His talk “Total War and Women Footballers – The Dagenham Invincibles of World War 1” tells the story of the Sterling Telephone Factory and the Sterling Ladies football team. Often referred to as the Dagenham Invincibles, they went unbeaten between 1917-1919. Steve’s grandmother, Lizzy Ashcroft, played for the team and was one of the most renowned players in the women’s game. The talk will include how the “Munitionette” game developed and what happened after the War.

It is well known that throughout the war, the needs of the Army resulted in women undertaking jobs in factories and agriculture, particularly within munitions making weapons and ammunition - hard, dirty, and dangerous occupations. These were major operations, with many of the workers living in works accommodation and distractions were needed. One of the things developed was the creation of football teams, playing under the name of the factories they worked for. In Essex, these included (in addition to the already mentioned Sterling Ladies) Hoffmans’ Ladies from Chelmsford and Kynoch Ltd from Shell Haven Creek.

Football boosted morale and many matches were played for charitable purposes, raising significant money for wartime charities. In some cases, spectator numbers exceeded some of the crowds seen in the Premier League even today!

Even after the war, many thousands turned up to see the matches, impacting on the returning men’s game, which had been suspended in 1915 for the war’s duration. Eventually attitudes changed and women’s football was effectively banned on professional pitches until the 1970s.

Steve Bolton is a recognised historian of women’s football throughout the ages. 2026 is, of course, a World



Cup year in the USA and Steve is one of a group that has curated an exhibition of Women’s wartime football at the World War One Museum in Kansas - the largest WW1 Museum in the world.

### Talks for 2026

Some of the talks at Hatfield Peverel through 2026 will concentrate on local history, including Maldon in the First World War and the history of the Hoffman and Marconi factories from 1914-1945, both highly important producers of military equipment.

We meet on the second Wednesday of every other month, January, March etc. from 7:30 for an 8pm start in the room 3 off the bar area and teas and coffee are available. We request an entrance donation of £4. Members and non-members of The Western Front Association are equally welcome. Any new visitors are guaranteed a friendly atmosphere and a warm welcome from a group of like-minded enthusiasts.

The Branch also has a monthly newsletter which carries information concerning Branch talks and events, remembering casualties from Essex, historical articles and forthcoming events or publications that may be of use to anyone with an interest of the First World War. # YOUR JANUARY FILM GUIDE: STORIES TO START THE YEAR



Our 21st season continues to pull in the crowds – great films and an excellent turnout for each screening. Currently topping the leader board is *Conclave* with an approval rating of 87.4%. The season continues with the screening of the Oscar nominated **September 5** on Wednesday 14th January 2026 and the highly acclaimed and Golden Globe nominated **Fallen Leaves** on Wednesday 28th January.

*September 5*, which stars Peter Sarsgaard, is a historical drama that focuses on the 1972 Munich Olympic hostage crisis from the perspective of the ABC Sports crew. The film highlights their transition from covering the Olympics to reporting on the hostage situation involving Israeli athletes, and showcases the intense and emotional experience of live broadcasting during a global tragedy.

Our second film of 2026, *Fallen Leaves*, is set in modern day Helsinki. It tells the story of Ansa and Holappa who are two lonely souls in search of love and who, by chance, meet in a karaoke bar. However, their path to happiness is beset by obstacles including lost phone numbers, mistaken addresses, alcoholism and a charming stray dog! The film premiered at the 76th Cannes Film Festival and was selected to compete for the Palme d'Or in its main competition section, where it won the Jury Prize. It went on to receive critical acclaim and was named one of the top five international films of 2023.

## Coming next month

Our first film for February 2026 is the 1973 classic, *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*, directed by Milos Forman and starring Jack Nicholson. The second is the highly acclaimed *Radical* set in a Mexican border town renowned for low achievement, violence and hardship.

Our 21st season continues until 3rd June 2026 with films being shown fortnightly on Wednesdays in 2026. The Club meets at Maldon Town Hall, doors open at 7.15pm, wine and soft drinks are available at a charge from 7.30pm and unless notified to the contrary all films will commence at 8pm.

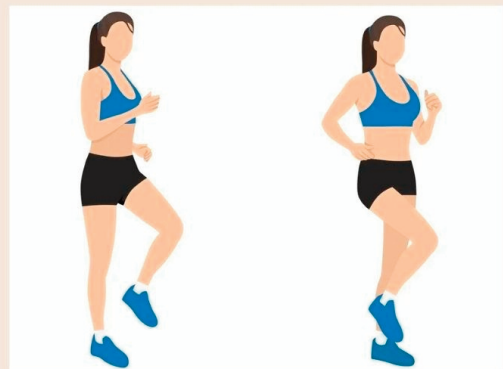

Heart health is something we build day by day. A short walk, a few minutes of marching, or a gentle workout in the park can make a huge difference over time.

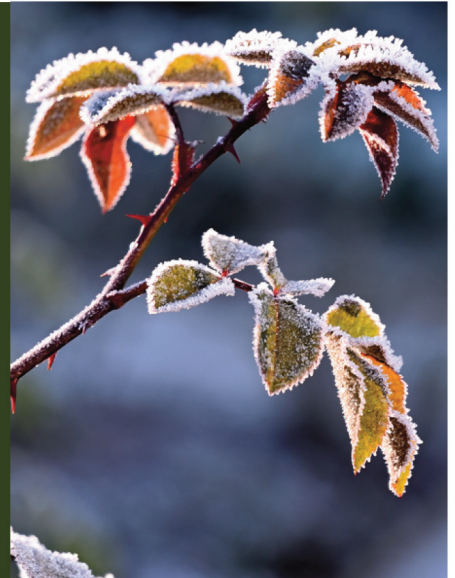




## HATFIELD PEVEREL & ULTING HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

### TIPS FOR YOUR GARDEN IN JANUARY

#### Prune:

Continue to prune climbing roses and overgrown shrubs to give them a good start for the spring. Apple and pear trees can also be pruned to removed dead or diseased branches.

#### Plant:

Bare root roses, shrubs and hedging. January is also a good time to plant ornamental trees. The cold months will enable these plants to establish roots without the demand of leaf and fruit production.

#### Propagate:

Take hardwood cuttings from deciduous shrubs. Root cuttings can also be taken from some perennials such as acanthus and oriental poppies

Many of these improvements have been made possible through generous support from Hatfield Peverel Parish Council.

There are a wide range of clubs and societies at the hall, which you can find on our clubs page on our website. We have lots of activities for children and adults and we have some new clubs coming to the hall in 2026, including a children's drama school. We're also hoping to add a yoga group.

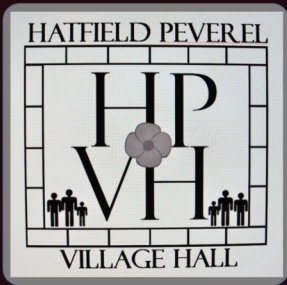
